Chairman's Message

A I d e n h a m P a r i s h C o u n c i I's (APC) Planning Committee continues to receive a large number of planning applications, on which to

Councillor Neil Payne applications, on which to comment. Many involve the demolition of an existing

smaller building and the replacement by a larger house. The current pleasant and verdant nature of Radlett is under constant pressure. In this respect, APC is working on the production of a Neighbourhood Plan for Radlett. As part of the consultation process, which is an integral element of the Plan, APC will be hosting a stall at the Winter Fair on Sunday 23 November. Councillors will be on hand to discuss planning issues, and whether these can be covered in the Plan. Everyone is invited to the Winter Fair, which has become a popular event in APC's calendar. I look forward to seeing you there.

APC has been busy recently commenting on a number of consultation documents, issued by Hertfordshire County Council (HCC), in relation to the proposal to close waste recycling sites. The wide extent of objections concerning Allum Lane convinced HCC to drop this particular proposal.

More recently, APC has commented on HCC's consultation on the Review of County Council Funded Bus Services, which proposed the removal of funding for evening services on the 602 route. This would have an adverse effect on residents of the Parish. APC has also commented on the consultation by the Post Office on the proposed move of the Radlett branch from its current site to Budgens.

Consideration is currently being given to a number of possible projects in the Recreation Ground and the allotments, some of which are dependent on each other. Estimates are being obtained and proposals will be considered in due course. The building of new toilet facilities in the Recreation



Ground is being actively reviewed.

At its meeting on 21 October, APC agreed upon the need, as promoted by the Local Government Association, to encourage local residents to become more involved in the work of the Council. This is in the light of the fact that all Parish Councillors stand down in May next year at the end of their four year term. An election to elect new Councillors takes place on 7 May 2015. (see article on page 10.)

May I take this opportunity, on behalf of all Councillors and the Council staff, to extend to all our readers Season's Greetings and Best Wishes for the New Year.

Neighbourhood Plan update



CONSULTATION EVENT ON SUNDAY 23 NOVEMBER, 2pm TO 6pm AT THE WINTER FAIR, THE RADLETT CENTRE

I am pleased to tell you initial background research is now under

way to provide Aldenham Parish Council (APC) with the basic data we can use to define a Neighbourhood Plan. We have an analysis of Census data for Radlett village from the CPRE (Campaign to Protect Rural England) and are also analysing data from our own records of some of the previous years planning applications. Hopefully, this will point us to the problems and issues that we face and be evidence for the Government Inspector at the end of the process.

APC have now appointed an agency to help us with the communications and project planning process. The agency will make sure that we keep to timescales and do not miss out any steps in the process. There are government grants available to help with this and APC will be looking to use this funding.

The first of these consultation events will take place at the Winter Fair, on Sunday 23 November at the Radlett Centre from 2pm-6pm. APC will have a stall in the foyer area and be on hand to talk about planning issues and how we can try to incorporate some of them into the Plan. We would like as many people as possible to come along and talk to us. The Neighbourhood Plan needs to represent the local communities views as well as our own.

It is worth pointing out that Neighbourhood Plans are not allowed to be negative. The Plan cannot say you want no development, and it cannot contradict anything that is in Hertsmere's Strategic Plan. However, the Plan can be much more specific about what sort of development is required, including the design criteria for homes and their surroundings, and also the type of housing that is needed for a diverse mix of the population.

APC are particularly concerned about the loss of bungalows and smaller homes in the village. We would like to know whether you think more of these are needed. Also, if you believe there is a need for more sheltered housing for the elderly as well as affordable homes for young families. Of course, when considering all these factors it is important to make sure the infrastructure is in place to adequately cope with any changes implemented.

Please spread the word about the Neighbourhood Plan consultation event to as many residents as possible. This is your time to be involved in the process, give your suggestions and observations and be part of this very important initiative for the future of Radlett Village.

For the past two years children at Newberries School have been benefitting from the gardening know-how of the Radlett Horticultural Society.




Every Friday afternoon the 7 to 12 vear olds have helped plant, water and pick an enormous variety of crops from their own allotment.

Radlett Memories



Earlier this year I was involved in two projects which required looking for details of Radlett life from times gone past; firstly, details of the founding of Christ Church in 1864 and then help with the commemoration of the start of World War One in 1914. It was whilst I was researching the latter that I came across a piece entitled *'Radlett Memories'*. It was written in 1928 by Miss Hannah Louise Bedford, a lady

who came to Radlett in 1895 with her parents, a retired Vicar and his wife. Her mother insisted that their house be as close as possible to the Church and it was, in fact, built closer than even the Vicarage was at that time.

The house was called Oak Bank and it was on the site of the flats of the same name. When it was built for the Reverend Thomas Bedford in 1895, it was the only building on that side of Watling Street – in fact many years were to pass before there any other buildings near it.

In her piece Miss Bedford recalled her first impressions of Radlett. She was probably the first resident to do so, although we have had several *"Reflections"* on the Radlett of older times written at later dates, two of which were displayed in Christ Church.

I make no apology for reproducing Miss Bedford's piece. It stands as a statement on the early days of our village and clearly describes the village at a time when it was still a rural, agricultural settlement.

"Radlett Memories" by Miss Hannah Louise Bedford (1847-1942). Written in 1928

"My first memory of Radlett seems to carry me back to the early dawn of time, visioning a tiny picturesque village of under five hundred inhabitants not long separated from the mother Church of Aldenham, very proud of finding self-expression in its own Church and the first Vicar, the Reverend Thomas Marsden, whose forceful personality a few of the older people in our village will still remember. To his energy we owe the school and later on the churchyard.

"In the early days of his ministry the children had to go far afield for their education and the dead were taken to Aldenham for burial. Ours was a purely agricultural population and hay our principal product. Most of the village folk found employment on the farms near the village or on one of the three estates of Aldenham Lodge, Newberries or Kendals Hall, the only large houses in the parish. Approached from the Elstree road the view one caught of the village was singularly pretty, a farm house crowning the top of the hill on the right, and on the left of the winding road a few cottages, some of which, including the quaint little Inn called the "Cat and Fiddle", still remain.

"Loom Lane at the corner below the Church was a real lane then, so narrow that it was impossible for two vehicles meeting each other to pass. One or other had to back into the nearest gateway. The Church beyond was not half its present size, but was quite big enough for the needs of the population. There, Sunday after Sunday, gentle and simple gathered for worship with unfailing regularity and should anyone be missing from his or her appointed place for more than one Sunday the shepherd of the flock was fairly certain to be round to know if illness were the cause of the absence.

"In so small a community rich and poor were bound in the same bundle of life. and if one member suffered the others were ever ready to share and relieve that suffering. Beyond the Church the road was bordered by green fields on the one side and Newberries Park on the other until one came to the group of cottages set back from the road with a grass plot in front of them enclosed by railings. The Railway Inn, with cottages behind it called The Square, on Primrose Hill, are still there for passers-by to see, and after the road turned up to Aldenham came the blacksmith's shop, another little Inn - for Radlett never showed signs of going "dry" - the Post Office and the Radlett Stores, which had been just inaugurated, and these, with the flint cottages opposite the station and a few houses on the far side of the station on the Shenley Road, pretty well constituted the village.

"The roads which now map out the place in every direction were simply nonexistent. Even Cross Path was true to its name, being simply a green track across fields. For recreation there was cricket

in the park in summer and of winter nights we gathered in the schoolroom where the local talent provided many a programme of song or recitation, varied occasionally by amateur acting. 'Appallingly dull" I fancy someone says. Perish the thought. We enjoyed every minute of it and what can one wish for more? In 1898 building began in earnest and spread like wild-fire over all the place. Landowners parted with their estates. Roads cut up our green fields into building plots and houses sprang like mushrooms into growth until the village of long ago bids fair to become a suburb possessing all the conveniences of a town.

"But some of us remembering Radlett in its primitive simplicity and beauty cannot but give a wistful backward glance on the days that are no more. And yet the Radlett of today has infinitely greater capacities for good, and of leaving its mark upon the world, than the tiny village of one's memory, could the same spirit which animated it then live among us now making of us a people of one heart and mind.

"Many men, many minds, perhaps, but through the community there should run that spirit of kindliness which makes the whole world kin, a vison maybe but not impossible of attainment. A service such as that which was held in our Church on armistice Sunday must surely be a foretaste of its fulfilment."

The Oakway

The Oakway shopping parade at the north end of Radlett village was built in 1924. There is a painted metal sign over every other shop depicting the date. The row of some twenty shops is architecturally significant with their mock Tudor oak framed facades. The shop floor areas are large and deep; they all have basements with flats above. Most of the flats are residential.

In the inter-war days these shops flourished and attracted much of the trade previously carried out nearer the centre of the village. Today there is an interesting mix of specialist shops from restaurants, a quirky children's hairdresser, a florist, a photographic shop and a children's clothing shop among others. Parking has been improved and it is often easy to find a space.

In the centre of The Oakway Parade, and sited at the centre of the shops at first floor level, are two black shields (*pictured above*). One depicts Hertfordshire County Council's coat of arms of a single stag and the other depicts a heraldic coat of arms of the Manor of Radlett. In the late 1800's, if a location didn't have a formal coat of



arms then a Crested China Company, perhaps Goss or Arcadian, would create one for that area. The Manor of Radlett coat of arms, while making an attractive shield on the building, is not an adopted coat of arms. In fact there never was and never has been a Manor of Radlett. Aldenham Parish Council developed their own coat of arms in the late 1980's as shown on the top left hand side of the front cover of this magazine.

At the turn of the century, there was an increase in domestic tourism thanks to the growth of the railways and a general increase in wealth. Crested China Companies, having created a coat of arms for an area, manufactured



miniature china crested ornaments to sell as tourist gifts and mementos. The ornaments would reflect items symbolic and significant to the town or village to which it was attributed. The photos above show a small cottage, printed with the crest of the Manor of Radlett. It possibly depicts the majority of buildings in Radlett in the early 1900's. How times have changed!

Phillimore Recreation Ground Project

Background

Phillimore Recreation Ground off Gills Hill was aquired by Aldenham Parish Council in the early 1900's from the Phillimore Estate. It consists of five distinct areas:

- The allotment area accessed down a small lane (still owned by the Philimore Estate) off Gills Hill Lane near St Johns School.
- Fir Spring Wood a small wooded area at the rear of houses in The Pathway. These trees are managed by Aldenham Parish Council (APC).
- The main recreation area, mainly grass, upon which there is an adult football pitch marked.
- The Radlett Bowls Club and Multi-Use Games Area (MUGA). The Bowls Club has a pavilion and an eight rink bowls green (maintained by APC staff). In this area there is also hard standing upon which there is one tennis court and a football/basketball court. The depot of the APC Groundstaff is also located in this area.
- Children's Play Area In 2009 through grants and APC funding, many of the pieces of equipment were replaced and new items bought. APC have also added various pieces in subsequent years and this year a catering van has been in operation selling refreshments.

Current situation

As previously reported the Pavilion (not the Bowls Club facility) has reached the end of its useful life and its future is being discussed. In September 2014, the Council decided to look at Phillimore Recreation Ground as a whole and the Parks & Open Spaces Committee will be considering the following with a view to starting most of the works in Summer 2015.

- Demolish the Pavilion.
- Create a new entrance into the Bowls Green for maintenance vehicles (they currently enter via a bridge from the Pavilion).
- Replace the rink banks and pathway around the Bowls Green (at least 40 years old).
- Install a new water supply and tanks for use on the allotments.
- Consider either improving the existing allotment plots used by the Groundstaff or relocating the activities carried out there (growing plants for use across the Parish and storing green waste) to the existing compound and releasing the two plots for general use.
- Improve the allotment car park surface and possibly the entrance road.
- Improve the main car park area to try to increase the car parking provision available.
- Consider the installation of outdoor gym equipment.
- Consider replacing existing shelter.
- Improve the drainage of the main field.

These are large projects and one which the Council will not undertake lightly. We are currently obtaining indicative estimates for the various projects.

New see-saw for Phillimore Recreation Ground

In August a new see-saw was installed in Phillimore Recreation Ground's children's play area. This new equipment replaced the existing see-saw, which was looking tired and required costly maintenance. This installation has been entirely funded

through a grant from Hertfordshire County Council's Locality Budget Scheme. The see-saw has long been a popular piece of equipment with children and Aldenham Parish Council would like to thank Hertfordshire County Councillor Caroline Clapper for this grant.



However, two areas have already been agreed:

- The provision of the new water supply to the allotments will happen over the winter months and the contractors have been told that this work must be completed by the 1 April 2015. This may mean access to the allotments will be restricted whilst contractors are on site.
- APC has sought estimates for the provision of a new toilet block in the recreation ground and associated sewage works. Again, as the pipework will be via the entrance from Gills Hill, this access road and the car park will be shut on occasions. We will advise residents and users when this is planned.

Funding

Once the estimates are in APC will consider the funding available. Some of this work will be funded from Section 106 monies. These are funds paid by developers to Hertsmere Borough Council towards the impact that their development has on the local area. The agreements on each development are specific for what the monies can be allocated to. APC will be negotiating with Hertsmere Borough Council to ensure that our projects meet these criteria. Other sources will be considered as well as APC's own capital funds.

World War 1 Centenary

A centenary event to commemorate WWI was held at Letchmore Heath on the Village Green and at the War Memorial on Sunday 10 August 2014.

Collecting newspapers



I have two sections to my newspaper collection. The first is the National Dailies including Sundays. The second is the Provincial Press.

Storage and display are problems. The collection is too big to allow but a few items at a time to be displayed. I select what I consider to be important events and have them framed. I have adopted 'a gallery approach' and framed items are changed at intervals. Currently items from the Great War and 'D' Day are hanging in the study commemorating their 100th and 70th anniversaries.

My interest in the National and Provincial Press began when I started to deliver newspapers in the mid 1950's. The National dailies were nearly all broadsheets, had far fewer pages and no colour. The Sundays had no magazines, sports, business or review sections and were much lighter than current issues. Sometime in the 1960's my dad was refurbishing a bedroom and a fitted c a r p e t replaced lino, underneath the lino were

copies of the Derby Evening Telegraph from 28 June and 4 July 1939. I found them fascinating and my collecting had started.

Daily

My collection has a few items from the 18th century. The Daily Courant was the first English (London) daily paper established in 1701. A copy from 1717 is in the collection. 19th century issues include Waterloo, Trafalgar and the first Daily Mail, which appeared in 1896. 20th century items form the majority of the collection, which ends at the end of the 20th century. The intention has been to collect items that record the Aldenham Parish Council and the Around Radlett team would like to thank Roger for allowing them to use copies of his newspapers in past editions of Around Radlett and also in the recent WW1 commemorative display in the Harpenden Building Society window.

main events of the century.

The Provincial Press collection contains mainly items of significance to the individual paper such as first, last issues, anniversaries and other special occasions. The aim was to obtain a representative copy of the daily provincial press throughout England. Sadly the Provincial Press is in serious

decline.



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
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
