# OVER 40 YEARS OF GROWING FOOD IN A RADLETT GARDEN

Forty-three years ago, together with my wife Beryl and two daughters we moved to Radlett. Following our family tradition we set about turning most of our back garden into growing vegetables and a little fruit. Being typical of Radlett the soil was heavy clay and in addition, as it is at the bottom of the valley alongside Tykeswater, the clay was embedded with large flints. Undeterred and being young and fit, I dug out 20 beds, measuring 3 feet by 10 feet. With much digging, manuring and composting we filled these beds with sufficient vegetables to feed our family. We added fruit trees and soft fruit and became fairly self-sufficient.

Very unusually, Beryl has recorded everything including the weight of every item harvested, these have all been entered into a large spread sheet which besides maintaining crop records gives us totals, average yield, weights and the best year's harvest for each crop. I doubt if any other such records exist in Radlett.

The total of all edibles over the forty-three years comes to 11536kg, which is 11.36 tons and reduced on a daily basis amounts to over 1.5lbs every day – DID WE REALLY EAT

### **Peter Cushion**

(Sadly Peter died in December 2018)

Our much loved spring plant, the snowdrop, was a symbol of hope and salvation to desperate soldiers more than 160 years ago.

Just as the poppy became a memorial to the casualties of the First and Second World Wars, so the snowdrop became a symbol of hope during the Crimean conflict of the 1850's. The British Troops fighting the war suffered freezing winters and with the lack of food and clothing they became bitter and demoralised.

As winters passed and spring began to appear so did the snowdrops, crocuses and other bulbs; the solders were delighted. They wrote home to their families about the snowdrops, sometimes pressing flowers inside their letters, they also collected bulbs.

From high-ranking officers to the ordinary soldier, the snowdrop, became an important symbol of Hope. Plant collectors began to realise just how much the 'flower of consolation' or 'star of hope' had come to mean to the troops and the bulbs were imported in great numbers. By the 1880's, the snowdrop and its variety of species became a collector's item and devotees knew the best way to preserve a rare snowdrop was disperse them as widely as possible and many bulbs were given away. Several gardens and woodlands are full of beautiful snowdrops in early spring and collectors included Gertrude Jekyll, James Allen and E A Bowles of Middleton House.

# THE ALBAN BUN..... the original HOT CROSS BUN



The Birthplace of the Hot Cross Bun is St Albans Abbey

It is claimed that in 1361,

a monk named Brother Thomas Rocliffe, who was attached to the refectory of St Albans Monastery, made a quantity of small spiced cakes and indented each bun with a cross on the top using a knife – no piped crosses were available in those days. Each bun was hand made, their shape and size varied.

Brother Thomas handed out the buns to those who arrived at the door of the Abbey on the special day of Good Friday; he welcomed everyone, especially the poor. His wonderfully flavoured buns became well known and year-by-year, by word of mouth so to speak, the Good Friday event grew in popularity.

The recipe for Brother Radcliff's bun was very much sought after and around the country many housewife's and bakers tried to imitate it. To this day the original recipe remains a closely guarded secret within the walls of the Abbey. For nearly 700 years, the Alban Bun has represented and important part of the Easter traditions at the Abbey.

Try the original bun for yourself at the Abbott's Kitchen, they are available from Lent to Easter, opening times Monday to Saturday 9.30 am to 4.30 pm and Sunday 12.30 pm to 4.30 pm

A planning application was submitted in January 2019 with proposals to develop the site in Gills Hill Lane; they include a new church, a new hall and a small development of affordable housing.


Lucy Phillimore gifted the land on which they stand in 1951 and a deed of covenant was established stating that it be used for 'ecclesiastical and charitable' purposes.



# Handy Services for Vulnerable People

Communities 1st (previously known as Community Hertsmere) has launched a new handy person service. From changing light bulbs, to fixing certain rails, fitting shelves, replacing toilet seats, no job will be too small. Gardening and cleaning services are also available.

The new service has been made possible from a grant by the John Apthorp Charity and is supported by Hertsmere Council and Hertfordshire County Council. It will be provided by gualified staff and fully-trained volunteers all of whom will be DBS checked and carry a photo-ID card.

Those in receipt of means-tested benefits will be charged £15 per hour for the Handy service and other eligible residents will be charged £25 an hour. The service is available over all of Hertsmere and runs from 10 am to 3.30 pm Monday to Friday. # **Aldenham Almshouses**

The Aldenham Almshouses are four small semi-detached bungalows located on the Watford Road at Round Bush which are owned and administered by the Aldenham Almshouses Charity. These were re-built in 1929 with a grant from J.P.Morgan who lived at the Wall Hall mansion at the time. One of the residents died in the summer and the trustees have been refurbishing the property in order for a new resident to move in. This has been made possible by a grant from the John Apthorp Charity which, as well as painting and decorating, has allowed the installation of modern electric radiators and a bright new kitchen. The Trustees are very grateful to the John Apthorp Charity, which does so much for the residents of Herts, Bucks and Beds, for this grant which is much appreciated.

### Danelaw

"Remember Remember the Fifth of November" subtitled "The History of Britain in Bite-Sized Chunks", by Judy Parkinson, tells us the following.

In 865 A.D. a huge army of Norwegian and Danish Vikings seized Scottish and Irish coastal areas and most of northern and eastern England. Moves to the south and west, however, were successfully blocked by Alfred, King of Wessex, who negotiated the division of England between himself and the Danish king, the latter retaining the part to the north and east of Watling Street, which ran from the south east up to Holyhead, near Liverpool. This became known as the Danelaw, where Vikings settled as farmers, traders or craftsmen.

So, for a local relevance here, those of us who live in Aldenham East would have been under the Danelaw, and those in Aldenham West, under the King of Wessex. Watling Street would probably have been a frontier post!

## **HERTSMERE'S LOCALPLAN**

Some of you will have attended the consultation event in November at the Radlett Centre, whereby Hertsmere were showing the site options and proposals for the Local Plan.

For many people who did not get a chance to discuss this with the Planners at the time, I would just like to clarify what this was all about.

1. Government have set targets for housing growth over a 15-year period, which all councils will have to work towards.

2. Last year, Hertsmere sent out a request to all local landowners to see if they wanted to propose their land for such development. These replies all came back in and were collated, and the resulting sites are what was shown in this Consultation event.

3. When added up the potential housing numbers for all these sites together, for Radlett, came to about 1500. This does not mean this is what is intended to be built.

4. Last year, Hertsmere estimated around 500 for Radlett. This may change but gives an indication of what could be needed.

5. The consultation event was asking people to evaluate all these different sites and come up with preferred and non-preferred sites, bearing in mind traffic, access, infrastructure for example. The analysis referred to infrastructure requirements, and asked residents to tell them what was needed on each of these sites.

6. The results from this consultation will be analysed over the next year and then some preferred sites will be announced. I hope this helps to clarify the process.

# Radlett Neighbourhood Plan Update

The Regulation 16 consultation which was conducted by the Borough Council, was completed at the end of the year. However very few replies were received from Radlett residents, quite possibly due to it coming out at the same time as Hertsmere's Local Plan Consultation, and thus causing confusion. In addition, APC sent out a leaflet about it to all homes, but it appears it was delivered quite late on in the process, and many people did not receive it at all. This could cause problems with the Inspector, who would expect to see more local responses.

So it has been decided to make a few adjustments to the wording, following some feedback from Hertsmere, and then re-submit it for the Regulation 16 process again.

This is likely to be happening through February and the intention is to post the letter to all households as early in the process as possible. We would encourage you to respond to this to enable us to show the inspector that Radlett is behind this plan and has local support.

Following this, the Government Inspector will check the plan to ensure that it was all done correctly and does not break any government rules. We hope that we will get though this with a clean bill of health. If all goes to plan, we hope to run the public vote on this at the same time as the local elections, at the beginning of May.

When this happens, please get out to vote on this and support it. It has taken a large group of residents over four years of hard work to get to this stage. It should be emphasised that this was not only councillors working on this, but, many local people from very different backgrounds and areas of expertise. If passed, it will be used to determine planning applications by Hertsmere which will help us to retain the green and pleasant atmosphere of the village and keep it a lovely place to live.

As always, Radlett Youth Council has been very busy in the last few months. The RYC organised





It was a snowy day in February 1985 when I first went into the Cat & Fiddle in Radlett and immediately fell in love with the place. Liz and I took over the tenancy from Doug Stockdale in the July, after Doug had been the Tenant with Truman's Brewery of Brick Lane, for the previous thirty years.

Doug died a year later, so I have increased the sum assured on my life insurance.


We had to fight our way past nearly a hundred other candidates; such was the ebullience of the pub business in those days. That was when the pub was the default venue to meet your friends and meet future friends. Today there are different ways.

There was no trade kitchen, so we built one and a new cellar, plus new ladies toilets. The existing Ladies' had one seating receptacle with no lock on the door, which was unnecessary because you could keep the door shut with your knees once you sat down. It also boasted a hand basin (cold water only) that was big enough to wash one hand at a time. We also put down a patio at the back and laid the garden to lawn, having moved off the donkey that lived there.

Tabard rugby club and Radlett cricket club used the Cat as the meeting place, we hosted the local acting and choral societies,

countless couples met their future spouses, and men their mistresses in the "booth of shame" that we called the snug.

Thirty years ago there were twenty pubs in the area, and played darts and guiz



with them. Of those there remain seven, and in another ten years probably a lot fewer.

It has been a joy and a privilege to have run the Cat for all those years, to have become a part the community, and I am very grateful for the fun and enjoyment of those years.

Today's Radlett and society in general has different demands that the traditional public house does not satisfy. So it's time for us to bow out.

We have made loads of mates over the years and the odd estate agent too, so to all of them go my heartfelt thanks and good wishes .

## **Ist Radlett Scouts Centenary**

This year 2019 1st Radlett Scout Group celebrates its centenary. The formation of the Group came about from Scouting's origins. Sir Percy Everett was a friend of Lord Baden-Powell and lived at Shopwick in Elstree. He formed 1st Elstree Scout Group (the oldest group in the country) which first met on the 13th March 1908. It is believed that a group of boys from Radlett including Jack Nash and Charles Cuddiford heard about the troop in Elstree and formed a patrol, walking each week from Radlett to Elstree to take part. In 1914 the First World War meant most of the members who formed the first Scout Troops went off to fight.

In 1919 Scout Headquarters started to register troops which included 1st Radlett which was registered on 16th May 1919. Jack Nash was the first Scoutmaster on his return from active service. It is commonly believed that there were Scouts in Radlett prior to the registration date but no proof has been found. However, there was not a troop in Radlett when Sir Percy Everett made a list in November 1909. On 29th November 1919, the Scout Troop performed "Minobi" at the Parish Hall, which consisted of 19 items of entertainment including a talk by Percy Everett on "The Scout Movement.

On 6th July 1920, Jack Nash and Charles Cuddiford found an old Army hut near Northaw which was dismantled and transported to Radlett. It was later moved and re-opened on 23rd September 1944, to cater for Air and Sea Scouts, next to what was Burrell

and Co. Coal Yard, now Everett Court; so called as it was opened then by Percy Everett. It stood here until 10th December 1965, when stormy weather caused the wall of the coal yard to collapse and knock the hut off its foundations. Hence Kent Lodge, our current headquarters, was built and opened on 10th June 1967.

In this centenary year we are jointly doing a number of events with the Guides as well as a Centenary celebration on Saturday 29 June for past members and leaders. # WATLING STREET

# Then

Now

We are going to travel back in time to Roman Britain in 100-200 AD and beyond, and look at the route of Watling Street; the most important Roman road that runs East to West across Great Britain.

We begin our journey in Dover where Watling Street starts (or perhaps in the original Roman port of Richborough near Sandwich until its harbour silted up). We travel northeast through Canterbury *Cantiacorum* on the A2 to London *Londinium* crossing Westminster Bridge. Founded in 43 AD, *Londinium* was originally a fort. Westminster Bridge was constructed at a suitable point on the Thames, using islands in the river. *Londinium* had many fine stone municipal buildings, including a governor's palace, theatres and temples. The streets were mainly paved. As a result of it's significance *Londinium* achieved provincial capital status in 190 AD.

We then travel along the A5 towards our home town of Radlett, at this point we have travelled 95 miles from Dover. We go onto St Albans *Verulamium*, through Dunstable *Durocobrivis* and onto Wroxeter *Vircomium*, where the river Severn crosses, we have now travelled 230 miles.

We arrive at Usk *Burrium* and at this point the road changes from Watling Street to Stone Street. We travel on to Caerleon *Iscia Silurum* where our Roman story finishes. We have now travelled 345 miles (276 on Watling Street and 69 miles on Stone Street).

Back on Watling Street in Wroxeter, our story changes in the eighteenth century. As part of the A5 turnpike, or toll road, the road from Wroxeter was extended along its current route to north Wales, through Llangollen and Bangor, terminating at Holyhead in Anglesey. The route from Wroxeter to Holyhead is some 105 miles in distance making a total of 335 miles from Dover.

In Roman times our journey on foot from Dover to Holyhead would take about 14 days, assuming we walked eight hours a day and travelled an average of 24-25 miles per day. If we travelled by wagon or cart it could be as slow as eight miles a day.

Travelling along our journey we would make overnight stops at a way station (or *mansios*) where basic hostel-like accommodation was provided. If we were upper class would find better accommodation and choose a *tabernae*, equivalent today of an off route Michelin starred hotel. Travellers also needed sufficient money to pay the various tolls or taxes along the way.

(with advice from Peter Cushion) The A5183 (Watling Street) is the old A5 road that runs between the A41 near Elstree, it was downgraded in the late 1970s to avoid routing main road traffic through St Albans. The A5183 starts where the A5 meets the A41 at Centennial Park in Elstree. The route, as the map shows, runs in a straight line through Radlett, alongside the small river of Tykeswater to St Stephen's Church and the King Harry PH in St Albans.

In the early 1940's, the road in front of Radlett Recreation Ground, which had swings and a seesaw, and is situated between Barclays Bank and the petrol station, was widened under a compulsory order obtained by the Highways Authority.



The former Radlett Recreation Ground had originally been gifted to the Parish by the landowner, Charles Part in 1894 when Aldenham Parish Council was first formed. Its centrepiece was an elaborate canopied drinking fountain, which was designed and funded by the Part family to commemorate Queen Victoria's Golden Jubilee in 1902. The drinking fountain was demolished to make way for widening of the road in 1942.

The area became known as Radlett Gardens. During the years that followed the Gardens were no more than scrub land and boarded up for Highways Authority use - it was an unsightly area in the centre of Radlett.



In 1999, the Gardens were landscaped and officially reopened by John Apthorp who cut the ribbon, accompanied by the Chairman of the Parish Council, Councillor Joyce Marston and Councillor Philip Eastburn.

# **Friends of Scrubbitts Wood**

Volunteers meet monthly in Scrubbitts Wood to improve and maintain this Local Wildlife Site that has bewen there for hundreds of years in the heart of Radlett. Recently, they tackled overgrown holly, helping to clear the main pathway and making it usable for all visitors. The wood has grand oaks and plants such as bluebells and dog's mercury.

The land was gifted to Radlett by the Phillimore family in 1909 and following an invitation by Aldenham Parish Council, The Friends of Scrubbitts Wood, a volunteer group, was initiated a year ago. A committee was formed and with the assistance of Aldenham Parish Council and Countryside Management Services, a constitution was set up, first aid training and leadership courses were undertaken, as well as attending volunteer days to experience how they are run.

Monthly meetings have seen our volunteers working on clearing invasive non-native species, such as snowberries and laurel, so that the woodland can be restored to the native state it would have been in hundreds of years ago.

A five-year plan created by Countryside Management Services, at the request of Aldenham Parish Council, sets out future projects, such as improving accessibility and upgrading of the main path to improve usability all year round. We also plan to install information boards to allow visitors to learn more about the wood, as well as the wonderful array of flora and fauna that call Radlett home. We also plan to continue our research into the history of the site, including as it does a rare World War Two Report Centre, erroneously thought for many years to be an air raid shelter!

Lastly, we hope to continue to foster the wonderful sense of community that working in the wood has created, as best summed up in a poem by one of our volunteers, Mia, aged 9:

"With you I learned types of trees, Their leaves, bark and other properties, We also planted bluebell seeds, Which will spread and grow for all to see. So thank you for making my day, Full of excitement in every way, Now these are the trees I will always remember All the way from January to December"
