Chairman's Message

he Annual Parish Meeting was held on 9 March, with a large number of residents attending. The presentation by our consultant, Clare Wright, on the Neighbourhood Plan for Radlett, attracted

Councillor Neil Payne significant interest, with many questions being put to the speaker. Residents also raised other queries relating to the activities of the Parish Council and the principal authorities.

The results of the Neighbourhood Plan consultation exercise were most encouraging, with approximately 850 questionnaires being returned, which is considered to be a good response. As the vast majority of questionnaires received had been completed by longterm residents, the steering group responsible for the Plan is proposing to encourage those who have moved to Radlett in the recent past to complete it, probably on an online basis. Task groups are being set up to undertake further research and discussion concerning the major themes identified for possible inclusion in the Plan.

Unfortunately, in March, the High

Court dismissed the case brought by St. Albans City & District Council concerning the proposed rail freight depot. Hertfordshire County Council has still to decide whether the land that it owns, representing approximately one-third of the total site required for the depot, will be sold to the developers.

The Council agreed in March that it would participate in a pilot project being organised by the county council. The project covers the regulations and, if necessary, the removal of "A" boards on the public highway. The involvement of the Parish Council should ensure that local outlets can continue to promote their businesses while, at the same time, minimising the inconvenience to pedestrians - particularly the less able and those with prams and push chairs.

We are pleased to have, once again, a

refreshment kiosk in the children's play area of the Recreation Ground.

On 7 May, there will be elections



for Aldenham Parish Council, at the same time as the forthcoming General Election and also Borough Council elections. I would like to put on record my thanks to all Councillors who have held office over the past four years, in terms of their contribution to the local community. In particular, I would like to mention two by name, John Howley and Ron Worthy, both of whom have served on the Parish Council for many years and also both acted as Chairman of the Council. Our grateful thanks go to them both.

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

The circular photo shows what we could have/should have seen. What a disappointment!


We have arranged to get together again, same place, on 12 August 2026, late afternoon, for the next eclipse and I look forward to meeting up again then!

Today, it is hard to imagine the plight of those very poor people who were forced to enter the dreaded workhouse. Without a home, income, often sick and with young and old people to care for the workhouse was the only alternative to homelessness. There was no benefit system or free health service. If you were unable to work through illness, disability, old age or perhaps you were a child without parents or family to care for you, then you had very little choice.

In 1725, an Act of Parliament first enabled parishes to create workhouses. Soon afterwards and according to the 1725 edition of 'An Account of Several Workhouses', a small workhouse was built in Aldenham to the north of St. John the Baptist Church and adjoining the now demolished Chequers Inn. Although some articles state this, it was not so. The original building was on land on the opposite side of the road. The new workhouse was built in its back yard. The Chequers Inn was not demolished, parts of it are now the Aldenham Social Club.

A 1777 report records workhouses existed in areas of Hertfordshire including Watford, Abbots (Langley), Rickmansworth and Aldenham, where thirty 'residents' are listed. The Aldenham Workhouse was a small but long building divided in two, half accommodated the men and the other half the women. We can assume the children were housed with the women.

In around 1782 the workhouse building was superseded by a larger building that was erected on part of the yard and garden belonging to the smaller one. A census taken in 1791 shows that a child as young as four years and a woman aged over eighty years were among the inhabitants of Aldenham Workhouse. Each person listed was given the status 'pauper'.

The workhouse remained in use

until the new Poor Law of 1835. The premises were then acquired by William Stuart, the owner of Aldenham Abbey (Wall Hall), who converted into an inn known as the Red Lion Inn. The venture proved unsuccessful and it closed in 1845. The building was then converted

into a terrace of nine cottages each let for a rent not exceeding £4 per annum. Subsequently, it became a terrace of four cottages, they still stand today and are known as Red Lion Cottages.

Area 1 - The Piggeries. Pigs were once kept there and access over Tykeswater was by a wooden bridge. The bridge no longer exists and the area is now a land locked site.

Upon the death of King George V in 1936, the then Lord Mayor of the City of London set up a committee to consider what form of national memorial to the King should be made. It was agreed that a statue would be built, which is now located in Old Palace Yard, south of The Lady Chapel, Westminster Abbey and opposite the House of Lords. They also agreed to set up a foundation 'to promote and to assist in the creation of playing fields for the use and enjoyment of all', as a living memorial to the late King.

Many sites were purchased through public subscription with additional grants financial being obtained through a Trust set up by the Lord Mayor's committee. Fortunately, for the residents of the Parish of Aldenham, the site chosen for the King George Playing Fields is in Cobden Hill, Radlett - an area purchased by Aldenham Parish Council. Public subscription was not required. However, to be given the title

a 'King George Playing Field' such an area had to be dedicated and used for public recreation and for 'playing on'. Schemes such as ornamental gardens or those that would disappear after a few years were not accepted.

Additionally, each entrance was required to have 'a dignified heraldic panel' to distinguish it as a 'King George's Field'. Such panels were originally sited on the left hand wall at the entrance in Cobden Hill, they were gifted by the late Dudley Fielder, a resident of Cobden Hill. Unfortunately, being a narrow entrance, the wall was hit by a large vehicle and badly damaged. Dudley rescued the panels (see above) before the wall was demolished and gave them to the Parish Council for safekeeping.

Annual Parish Meeting 2015

The Annual Parish meeting took place at the Radlett Centre on 9 March 2015. There was an audience of over eighty people. The main topic was a presentation from Clare Wright regarding the Neighbourhood Plan process. This was very informative and certainly answered most of the questions people had about the process and relevance of a plan. Below is an update on other questions asked:

Mobile catering unit in Phillimore Rec. The Council is pleased to announce that a new catering unit is in place.

Trees along the pathway at Phillimore Rec. It is true that the Council has not replaced all the trees along the pathway in exactly the same positions as they were. This is partly because some of the feedback was that the trees were too close leading to people feeling unsafe to use the pathway after dusk. However, the same number of trees have been replanted in the Recreation Ground, some along the pathway and

some near the depot.

Cycle Tracks There were concerns raised regarding the cycle track along the A5183. This has been taken up with Hertfordshire County Council as part of a general initiative on cycling in the Parish.

Hire of the Radlett Centre Auditorium during the day The Radlett Centre is not part of the Council, however, Aldenham Parish Council do have two representatives on the Board and this question was raised with the General Manager by Councillor Chris Wilkins.

It is worth emphasising that bookings for the theatre are often made months ahead and may cover several days. There are a variety of configurations and staff are needed to make the necessary changes, both before and after an event. This can limit short term flexibility and, of course, adds to costs.

Burglary at Phillimore Recreation Ground

In the early hours of 18 March 2015, premises at Phillimore Recreation Ground, off Gills Hill, Radlett were targeted by burglars. A window was forced open in the Pavilion and the office, used currently by the Police Community Support officer, was ransacked and his bicycle stolen.

The Groundstaff depot was also targeted with access being gained through a window. The area was ransacked with an attempt being made to remove some of the contents.

The mobile catering unit, owned privately by Paula's Deli, was also broken into. The damage internally to this unit was so severe that it had to be repaired before she could commence trading. It also meant that the Council had to postpone the launch event due on 2 April 2015 and the Easter event had to be cancelled. I am pleased to say that Paula's Deli is now up and running.

This incident is on CCTV and the Council asks that if you have any information that may lead to the apprehension of these people that you please call the police on 101. It is also worth noting that outbuildings seem to be very vulnerable at the moment so the police ask you to be vigilant and report any incidents of attempted or actual break-ins to your sheds etc.

This spring Aldenham Parish Council has planted a group of trees at the bottom of The Rose Field, where it borders Tykeswater, and also trees along the boundary of Tabard Rugby Football Club's pitch. The planting was carried out to screen the railway line which runs behind both fields. These trees were planted from the Council's tree nursery which the groundstaff maintain at the top end of The Rose Field. This spring, sections of hedging were planted along the top of the Picnic Field (where it joins Salter's Field) to landscape the greenery around the newly installed kissing gate.

Radar Keys

The Royal Association for Disability and Rehabilitation (RADAR) set up a key scheme, now run by Disability Rights UK, by which people with a disability can obtain a RADAR key to access locked disabled toilets, and to open some gates in parks and on footpaths. lock on the kissing gate leading into Phillimore Recreation Ground and also on the gate at the top of the Picnic Field.

When to cut or not cut your hedges

We are all responsible for the maintenance of our own hedges.

Overhanging the Public Highway

If hedges overhang the public highway and obstruct part of the pavement it is the responsibility of the householder to cut them back. Overhanging hedges can be dangerous. They can cause injury to those walking on the pavements and in some cases force pedestrians to walk into the road. They can be a hazard to motorists who are unable to see past the offending hedge forcing them to position their vehicle further onto a junction.

Overhanging hedges causing a

nuisance is a Highways matter and should be reported to Hertfordshire County Council who will write to the householder asking them to cut it back. The identity of the person making the complaint will not be revealed. To contact HCC telephone 0300 123 4047 or email cschighways@hertfordshire. gov.uk.

Overhanging a neighbouring property

Overhanging branches can be a nuisance to neighbouring properties. In the first instance speak to your neighbour and ask them to trim back, alternatively ask if you can trim the branches. It has been said that you are entitled to throw the overhanging branches into the neighbouring property but perhaps this is not wise if you wish to maintain a good friendly relationship with your neighbour, so speak to them first.

When to cut

The hedge-growing season is generally March to October but it makes the greatest sense not to cut while birds are nesting (March to end July). It should be an easy thing to find out by general observation and occasionally peering into your hedges to see what lies within. Interestingly, it is an offence under Section 1 of the Wildlife and Countryside Act of 1981 'to intentionally take, damage, or destroy the nest of any wild bird while it is in use or being built'.


On Friday 10 April, thirty-seven people from the Radlett branch of the

Operation Gnome - protecting gardens and allotments

Hertfordshire Constabulary is launching Operation Gnome, a new initiative to help remind residents to keep their gardens, sheds and allotments secure. Inspector Paul Lawrence, from Hertfordshire Constabulary's Crime Reduction Unit, advises: "If you use your shed or garage to store valuable equipment, like lawn mowers, power tools, bicycles or leisure equipment, don't make it easy for burglars. Use good quality locks or even an alarmed padlock, keep garden gates locked and visibly mark items with your postcode and register them on www.immobilise.com."

These are some of the ways you can make your outbuildings more secure:

- Always lock your shed, preferably with two 'hasp and staple' locks (one near the top and one near the bottom of the door) or use or an alarmed padlock
- Secure your rear garden by locking entry gates with a padlock
- Burglars can use garden tools to break in, so make sure you securely lock away any tools after use
- Ensure boundary fences are secure and in good condition. Spiky plants along garden boundaries are good additional deterrents

HERTSMERE COMMUNITY SAFETY PARTNERSHIP Tools and gardening equipment should be visibly marked with your postcode and house number - this

can deter thieves and help police

identify the rightful owner

- Remember to lock your garage door securely. Metal 'up and over' doors can be secured with extra locks fitted either side and/or a floor-mounted locking 'T' bar with a closed shackle padlock. Wooden garage doors can be secured with two substantial hasps and staple locks and closed shackle padlocks (your local DIY store can advise on the most secure options)
- your Neighbourhood Watch or Allotment Watch to help reduce crime in your local area.
