Chairman's Message

The **Remembrance Day services** on 13 November, in both Radlett and Letchmore Heath, were attended by a large number of residents, as in previous years. Wreaths were laid in both locations on behalf of Hertsmere Borough Council, Aldenham Parish Council and a large number of other organisations.

The **Winter Fair** on 27 November, organised by the Parish Council, was enjoyed by numerous residents of both the Parish and also the surrounding area. It culminated in the turning on of the Christmas Lights at 4.30 pm. Many residents have commented favourably on the lights, following the extension of the lighting in the trees in the southern end of Newberries Parade.

This year, **Mitzvah Day** fell on the same day as the Winter Fair. Nevertheless, around 20 volunteers planted Spring bulbs around the Phillimore Recreation Ground – our thanks go to all concerned.

During November/December 2016, contractors undertook a deep activation system in the **Recreation Ground** in order to improve the drainage, as the ground had become very compacted in recent years.

A selection of **Philip Eastburn's archives** was displayed in the window of the Harpenden Building Society in

October, followed by a fuller exhibition in the Apthorp Gallery in the Radlett Centre throughout the month of December. The Council was pleased to be able to make a grant, together with the Radlett Festival Committee, to the Radlett Archive Group which is now responsible for the archives.

The consultant advising the **Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group** has been formulating the draft plan from policies and documents given to her by the Steering Group. Good progress has been made and it is hoped that the draft plan will be subject to discussions with Hertsmere Borough Council and also an independent 'health check' in the near future. However, the timing of completion of the Neighbourhood Plan may be affected by the recent proposal by Hertsmere Borough Council to produce a new Local Plan, to guide growth and development across the Borough to 2036, and the related "Call for Sites" (see the article on page 10 for further details).

Hertsmere Borough Council has been undertaking a review of the **Controlled Parking Zone** ('CPZ') in Radlett over the past year or so. Proposals for individual areas have gone out for consultation to those residents directly affected by the proposals. In addition, the Parish Council organised a consultation event at the Radlett Centre in January for residents generally.

Since the consultation event organised by the Borough Council in October,

there is nothing further to report on the proposed **Newberries Car Park development**. However, the Parish Council resolved at its December meeting that its stance concerning the development is the same as most of the residents who completed the feedback questionnaires at the consultation event, namely that it is interested in the development, but with reservations that have been previously highlighted to the Borough Council.

The Parish Council is giving consideration to using the open area forming part of Scrubbits Wood, facing on to Gills Hill, for an **affordable housing scheme** of eight flats. There are plans to enhance the wooded area to include a robust pathway and a planting/landscaping scheme. Plans are subject to surveys.

I would remind readers that all residents of the Parish are invited to attend the **Annual Parish Meeting** to be held on Monday 13 March 2017 at the Radlett Centre. Please see the attached reports and agenda. We are very pleased that Christine Lyons, the Head of Planning and Development at Hertsmere Borough Council and Mark Silverman, Policy and Transport Manager, have kindly agreed to make a presentation at the meeting on the proposed new Local Plan and on the implications for residents.

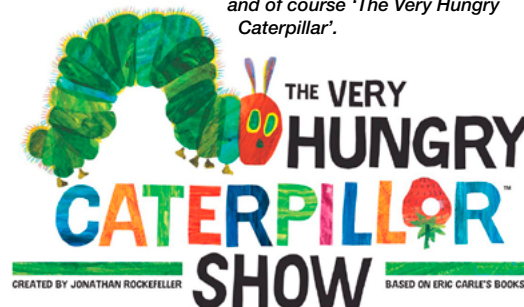

On a foggy Tuesday afternoon in late January, a large number of people turned up at the Radlett Centre to attend an Open Meeting hosted by the Radlett Archive Group, and what an entertaining and informative meeting it was.

The Chair of RAG, Stuart Nagler, opened the meeting and gave an update of the aims and objectives of RAG i.e. to initially have a permanent exhibition of the archives of the Parish of Aldenham and ultimately to have a museum. A museum may sound ambitious but why not; the area we live in is steeped in history and the information and archival material available is vast in terms of old photographs, old maps and well chartered records.

The highlight of the meeting was a reminiscence tape, with a rolling background of photos of old Radlett and voice-overs from four ladies; two of whom were born in Radlett and two who came to live in Radlett at an early age – Edie Oakley, Joan Brooks, Joan Oakes Monger and Peggy Burrell, who together, can put their joint ages at over 360 years. An amusing 'Look Back' Question and Answer debate followed to which they happily replied to without any hesitation.

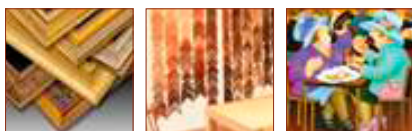

What is an MBE? (Member of the Order of the British Empire)

The honours CBE (Commander...), OBE (Officer...) and MBE (Member...) were created in 1917 by King George V during World War I as a way of rewarding civilians and servicemen in support positions for their contribution to the war effort. According to the Cabinet Office, an MBE is given for an "outstanding achievement or service to the community. This will have had a long-term, significant impact and stand out as an example to others". Now they are used to recognise an achievement or service to the community in any area, such as the arts, charity or education.



Howard Guard, MBE



Radlett resident, Howard Guard, has been awarded an MBE in the Queen's New Year's Honours' list. The award was given in recognition of his services to charity and to the community in Hertfordshire.

In 2007/8 Mr Guard served as High Sheriff of Hertfordshire and he has served as a Deputy Lieutenant since 2009. In this capacity he assisted in organising the celebrations for the Queen's Diamond Jubilee in 2012 and also made a film on Life in Hertfordshire during the First World War in 2014. Its premier was at the Rex Cinema in Berkhamstead on August 4th. Two thousand copies of the film were distributed to schools and museums and it has enjoyed a wide audience. It was produced at the University of Hertfordshire, who honoured him with an Honorary Doctorate of Arts in 2015. Mr Guard presented the Queen with her personal copy in May 2016.

He served as Chairman of the Fabric Trust at St Albans Cathedral for seven years, in which time funds were raised to cast a new peel of bells and create The Pulpitum Crossing, a vital crossing point underneath the organ which now connects the North and South aisles which were otherwise unconnected.

In 1990 he had, together with his wife Sheila, bought the redundant Church of St Nicholas at Great Munden, close to his childhood home of Knebworth. The foundation stone for the new vestry was laid by Archbishop Robert Runcie and the Guard family spent ten years conducting a full restoration, opening in time for the Millennium. The church hosts concerts, operas and one man plays and is used by the local community.

Our congratulations go to Howard Guard MBE on this very well deserved award.

Potholes

Hertfordshire County Council is responsible for the roads in Hertfordshire and has allocated £1m to fix potholes across the county. The Department of Transport's Pothole Action Fund has given extra funding of £943,000.

A schedule of works has been drawn up and a total of 127 sites throughout the county have been selected, many of which have been flagged up by the public.

Over the next few months, approximately 16,000 square metres of roads throughout the county will be resurfaced.

A spokesman for HCC's Highways said "Hertfordshire's 3000 miles of roads are some of the busiest in the country, with over five billion vehicle miles travelled every year and

this inevitably results in wear and tear leading to potholes and defects. This year we have spent over £30m on road maintenance and repairs. We have taken time in planning to ensure that this money is used as effectively as possible to improve the condition of our roads".

FC Academies. Now his goal is to further the development of one of the United Synagogues success stories, Radlett.

Addressing 330 congregants at his induction service, Rabbi Hughes was bullish about the future of the Hertfordshire congregation.

He said, "We've built a beautiful new synagogue, the money raised by our own members. We have weekday services, three sites for the High Holy-Days, a youth director, a rabbinic team, dedicated care volunteers, programmes and events for everyone, guest educators, office staff, over 400 kids and 1,200 members."



Mitzvah Day 2016

Continuing our tradition of engaging in horticultural events (*Groundforce Challenge – Put Your Wellies On*), local synagogues, churches and Tolpits Lane Islamic Muslim Community Centre, Watford, all joined with the Radlett Horticultural Society to plant four huge sackloads of daffodils in the Philimore Recreation Ground in Radlett.

In the previous six years we have cleared scrubland at the Rose Field and planted a tree nursery of some 400 saplings to be re-planted in the streets and parks of Radlett, and surrounding areas. We have sensitively cleared Scrubbits Wood in line with the woodland management scheme and in 2014 and 2015 planted daffodils in Aldenham Green, and Letchmore Heath by the War Memorial.

Those who have visited these areas will have seen the difference that we have made to make the world a better place or, at least, our bit of it!

In the Spring, the residents of Radlett, Aldenham and Letchmore Heath will be able to enjoy the fruits of our efforts and remember the words of William Wordsworth...

"I wandered lonely as a cloud. That floats on high o'er vales and hills, When all at once I saw a crowd, a host, of golden daffodils."

Local Plan – Planning for Growth

In December 2016, Hertsmere Borough Council indicated that it is proposing to produce a new Local Plan to guide growth and development across the Borough to 2036 and beyond. The Borough Council is keen for residents to give their views as to the most important issues for the area, and the Borough's future.

An initial consultation paper, which should have been sent to all residents before Christmas, highlighted that the evidence suggests that the Borough needs around 9000 new houses and 9000 new jobs over the next 15 years. The options for growth, in terms of location, include brownfield sites, the extension of current towns and villages into the surrounding Green Belt, or the creation of a brand new stand-alone settlement (with 4000 homes or more) in a new area of the Borough.

Option 1 – Brownfield Development and Increased Density

Brownfield land (sometimes referred to as Previously Developed Land) is generally land which is, or was, occupied by a permanent structure e.g. an industrial park or an empty office building.

Given the nature of the land these are typically (but not always) smaller sites located within, or near existing towns and villages, which means that they are generally better served by existing infrastructure and public transport. However, the pressure on local roads and services from the development of these sites can be significant.

Building on brownfield sites can reduce the pressure to build on Green Belt

land, but land contamination, adjacent uses such as factories, and a poor location, such as out-of-town industrial estates, can make it difficult to provide homes here.

Option 2 – Village/Town extension

A village/town extension can vary in size (circa 200 to 2000 new homes). The larger the development, the easier it is to deliver new affordable housing, schools, GPs, jobs and plan in new parks, gardens and landscaping. As any extension would be near to an existing village or town, the community would benefit from existing transport links and local services, and those services could be improved. Given the nature of this option, and the fact that almost all land outside of existing settlements in the borough is in the Green Belt, any village/town extensions will have to involve building in areas currently in the Green Belt. The scale and complexity involved in the planning and delivery of these extensions also means that they will take longer to deliver. This means they may not be able to provide for the short term need for more housing and employment in the local area.

Option 3

A brand new, stand-alone settlement (circa 4,000 homes or more) which would have its own infrastructure and services such as schools, GP surgeries and shops. The option benefits from its ability to provide a significant amount of new homes, retail and employment space. The size of the development will also make it possible to fund major new infrastructure projects which might be needed, such as a new secondary



school, bypass or country park. One of the main challenges for this option is whether there are suitable Green Belt sites in the borough. A new settlement would take a long time to plan and build (10 years +) due to its size and complexity. This may mean that we will have to identify other smaller development sites to maintain the short to medium term, supply of new homes and jobs.

A more detailed Issues and Options document will be published for public consultation in the spring/summer of this year.

Hertsmere Borough Council has also issued a "call for sites" of its Housing and Economic Land Availability Assessment (HELAA), a technical study that provides an overview of the Borough's Housing and Economic land supply. The current HELAA update will help the Council identify land that may potentially be available for future development and is an important step in the preparation of the local plan.

Letchmore Heath – A Quintessential English Village

Situated 20 miles from Charing Cross, with a population of 200 residents, Letchmore Heath has everything you could wish for in a picturesque English village setting; a pond with ducks, geese and other wildlife, a village green, a village hall, a manor house, a public school, pretty cottages and the all important pub.

The whole village is in the Conservation Area and surrounded by Green Belt land making it a haven for commuters who want a fairly short trip to work and a quiet and peaceful home life.

Its name, first recorded in 1299 as Lachmeres Heath comes from an Anglo-Saxon word meaning 'muddy pond heath'. The pond is indeed muddy and murky – it could be the soil that lays beneath the pond that is the cause or the drain at the side of the pond that takes rainwater from the road and disperses into the pond. The pond is the responsibility of Aldenham Parish Council and works carried out some five years ago to remove silt and other debris have certainly improved the look of the pond and increased its wildlife inhabitants.

The manor house, Piccott's Manor, was never a true manor in the sense of the word however; the lords of Piggott's enjoyed a certain amount of authority over the villagers as many of them were employed there. The original house and buildings are known to have existed as far back as the 12th century. The house was originally called Pygot's Manor and was named after a local Juror, who was an important person in the village in those days. In 1884, the house that we see today was re-built in mock Tudor style. In 1973, Piccott's Manor was purchased by the Beatle, George Harrison for the Hare Krishna's to use as a theological training college, it was renamed Bhaktivedanta Manor.

The area and buildings that once existed rear of the Three Horseshoes public house have a long history and can be dated back as early as the 1600's during the reign of King Charles 1st. At that time a small wooden building existed, it is not clear what industry

took place there; some say it was for the manufacture of cloth others say the cloth industry was located in Factory Field.

Today, on the same site is Fusion, a property development company. The building was erected for office purposes some twenty five years ago and was called Burgundy House. Prior to this development a corrugated black building stood on the site and was used as a wood store and by a coffin maker. Christian services and burials were held at St John the Baptist Church, Aldenham; the coffins were conveyed on a wooden barrow from Letchmore Heath across Factory Field to the Church.

Another industry of Letchmore Heath was a Straw Hat Factory located in Factory Field, also known locally as the Four Minute Field; it is said that was the time it took to walk across the field from Letchmore Heath to Round Bush.

In 1821, a factory stood approximately one third of the way along the footpath from Letchmore Heath to Round Bush in an area known as the Great Dell. In 1821, a new factory was built and replaced an earlier building that stood there in 1808 together with a dozen or so cottages. It is documented that in 1838, a Major Geary owned the factory; he was described as a straw hat manufacturer. A census of 1851 shows that eleven females, both adults and children, who lived in Letchmore Heath were listed as straw hat makers. It is thought that the reeds used in the plaiting and hat making process were grown on Factory Field. Historically, Letchmore Heath was once a hub of small industries some fifteen or so, including a coal merchant, a smithy, sawyers and village shops.

In 1599, Richard Platt, a London businessman and brewer built a grammar school, Aldenham School. It is rumoured that one night in the mid 1590's, Richard Platt was making his way from Radlett to Aldenham in his coach and two horses when a huge south westerly gale blew up; his coachman turned off to Letchmore

Heath to seek shelter, they laid up their horses at Greene's Coaching Stables and walked across to the Three Horseshoes public house where they sat in front of a roaring fire and were given food and ale. The villagers put them up for the night and they went on their way in the morning.

Such was Richard Platt's gratitude for the kindness of the villagers, on that treacherous night; he bought a twelve acre site and founded a free school for Aldenham Boys. The building of six alms cottages to house the elderly and poor and the schools of Delrow, Medbourn and Letchmore Heath followed. Some of the masters at Aldenham School were housed in the village including one at Ushers Cottage in Back Lane.

Originally, there were three public houses in Letchmore Heath, the Three Horseshoes built in 1586, which also housed a smithy on the right hand side. The second pub was the Bricklayers Arms built in 1810 and situated on the corner of Common Lane and Elstree Road. Sadly, it was destroyed in an air raid in World War II, killing the landlady, Laura Jones and a neighbour's daughter Irene Evans, aged 15 years, who lived at Clarendon Cottage. The third pub was the Taverner's in Back Lane, this became a private residence in the late 1800's.

The same family, the Burnells, built most of the cottages and houses in Letchmore Heath. The last surviving member of the family, Ronald Burnell, recalled that the timber used for these houses was felled, seasoned and processed by his great-grandfather, grandfather and great uncles in a sawyers pit close to The Three Horseshoes public house.

The village Memorial Hall was built in 1920 by public subscription to commemorate the fallen of World War I. It can be hired for private functions.

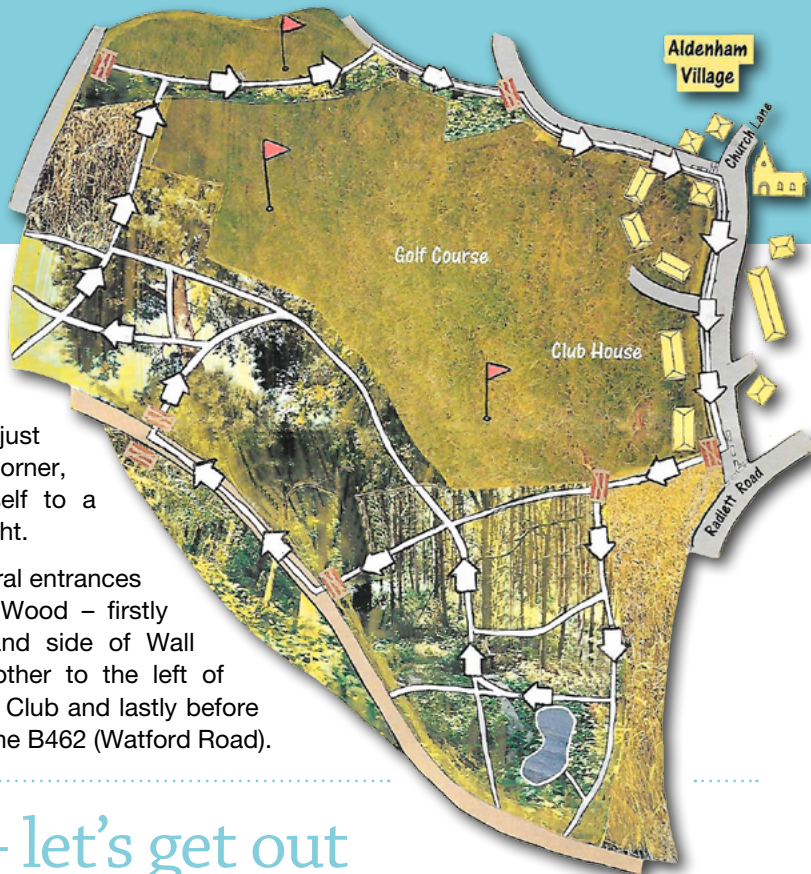
Berrygrove Woods

The woodland is owned and managed by Hertfordshire County Council. They form part of the 1000 acre Wall Hall Estate that was bought in 1947 to preserve the Green Belt. Once managed for its sporting interest, Berrygrove is now a working woodland, showing how commercial timber harvesting can be successfully combined with both conservation and recreation.

Local residents say the best time of the year to visit Berrygrove Woods is when

the bluebells are flowering and spring is just around the corner, so treat yourself to a spectacular sight.

There are several entrances to Berrygrove Wood – firstly on the left hand side of Wall Hall Drive, another to the left of Aldenham Golf Club and lastly before the bridge on the B462 (Watford Road).

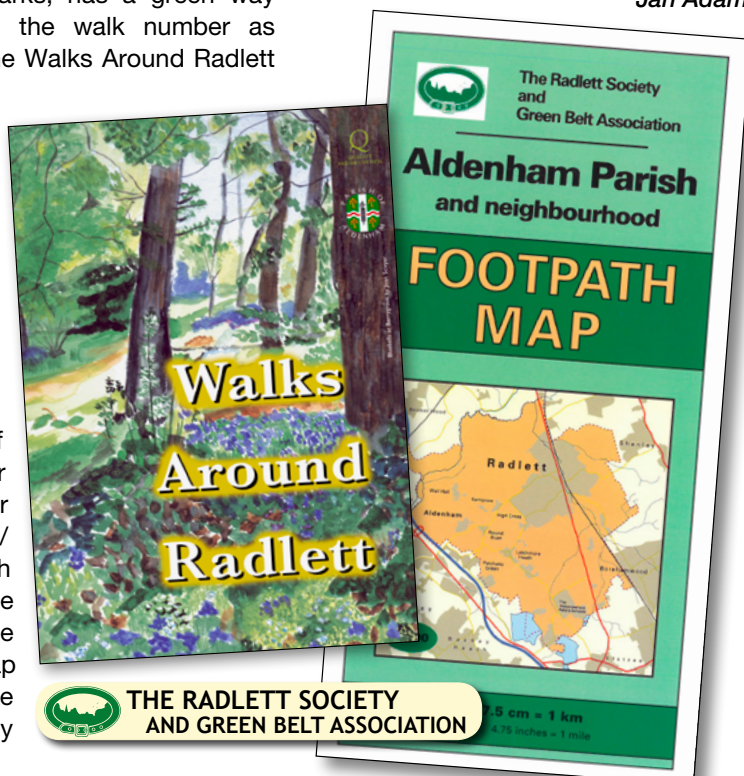
