In the meantime, I was delighted to be invited again, along with Brenda Batten, Hertsmere's Mayor, to present the medals and awards at the Rotary Club's Annual Fun Run on May Day Bank Holiday. Once again, there was a terrific turn out, both of adults and children for the two courses. They all did incredibly well, and I was very impressed with their enthusiasm and commitment. Many congratulations to all!

In terms of the Neighbourhood Plan, we ran a second consultation evening in response to some residents who had been away at the first occasion and wanted the opportunity to understand the detail first-hand. This consultation period is now finished, so we can move onto the next, which is the involvement of the Government Inspector. However, it becomes clear that several residents are confused about the difference between the

Neighbourhood Plan, and Hertsmere's proposals for the Local Plan. In very simple terms, the Neighbourhood Plan has been put together by some councillors but mostly by residents, and covers design aspects of buildings, size, mixture of small and large homes, retaining the verdant nature of the village, spacing between buildings, and generally keeping the village a pleasant place to live and the semi-rural appearance of many roads. Hertsmere's Local Plan is the one where discussions continue about how many new homes should be built, and where these might be, and the two are quite separate.

I am now retiring and have handed over the Chair to Cllr Garry Walton, who has been a councillor for many years. I wish him the best of luck, and if you have issues, you know who to call!

I will have now moved down the South Coast, but will be up and down regularly to Radlett, I am sure, so hope to see some of you again in the future.



I am sure the village will be in good hands of the new councillors, and I wish you all good fortune in the future.

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All change at Aldenham Parish Council

Aldenham Parish Council is in its 125th year of existence, its first official meeting was in early 1895. The Council is the civil parish, being part of the Local Government branch of Community Governance in England. This is opposed to the ecclesiastical parish which is part of the Church of England. The Council own or lease over 65 acres of land and is responsible for some 1500 trees, two children play areas and various open space which encompass informal recreational use as well as formal sports such as rugby, cricket and Bowls. It also has an allotment area in Radlett.



The Council consist of twelve elected councillors who set policy, and the equivalent of 7.83fte staff in either the offices at the Radlett Centre or the outside staff at the depot in Phillimore Recreation Ground.

The Council have elections every four years, normally at the same time as the Borough Council elections, and this year they were held on May 2nd. Of the twelve Councillors elected in 2015 five had decided to retire, and one was not re-elected.

A look back from some retiring councillors

Neil Payne

I was first elected to the Parish Council in 1991, and served on the Council for 4 years until, rather unexpectedly, the Conservatives lost Aldenham West for the first time in 1995. Despite having to travel widely on business during that

period, I was an active councillor. The highlight was my involvement in the planning for The Radlett Centre, under the vision and leadership of the then chairman Douglas Hicks. This was fascinating, and led to my appointment as one of the four Council representatives on the initial RCT Board when the company was set in 1996.

In 1999, I was elected as a Borough Councillor. In 2001 I was elected Leader of Hertsmere Borough Council, which role I continued to occupy until 2006. Following my retirement as a Borough Councillor in 2007, I was asked to fill a casual vacancy on the Parish Council in 2009. Initially, I was not very active, with my only involvement being on the RCT Board. However, this did not last long, and I soon immersed myself in the Council's activities, particularly the Planning Committee. I was appointed to chair the newlyformed Strategic Planning Committee, which had the task of systematically reviewing and updating procedures in order that the Council managed the Council's assets more efficiently, and also put in place a long-term strategic budgeting system.

In 2013, I took over as Chairman of the Parish Council from Ron Worthy. I was privileged and honoured to lead the Council for 5 years until May 2018, when I stepped down as Chairman in view of my impending move, together with my wife, to Harrogate in order to be closer to our daughter and family. I am proud of the progress made in addressing some of the major issues facing the Council. Despite moving up to Harrogate in May 2018, I continued to serve on the Parish Council until May 2019, and in the last year attended a number of meetings of both the Full Council and certain committees.

One of the major aspects of my role as Chairman was to oversee the initiation of the Local Neighbourhood Plan, and to chair the Steering Group responsible for its preparation.

This proved to be a demanding, but most satisfying, task, and regarded by me to be a priority for our residents.

I found it most rewarding to be able to give back something to the local community, having been resident in Radlett for 42 years.



Chris Wilkins

I was elected 12 years ago. My aim was to make a difference. My particular interests were, and remain, recreation and leisure.

Along with others - fellow-councillors and

officers – I have been able to improve and make better use of the many pieces of land owned by the Parish. APC now offers many more leisure activities than it did 12 years ago.

The highs have included the friendship and positivity of the many people I have met and worked with and observing the increased participation of local residents in community-led activities.

The only low has been the extreme and ill-informed criticism and negativity that has been broadcast by a small minority, particularly via social media. Such unpleasant and ignorant comment is highly dispiriting to those who give up their time, for no financial reward, to do their best for the community. In 12 years, I failed to find the "trough" into which my snout was alleged to be inserted and I was not offered any "brown envelopes"!

Could I have achieved more: yes. Did I get everything right: no.? At least, hopefully, I satisfied the majority.



Viv Charrett

I first joined the Council 16 years ago, after taking early retirement from GE. I really didn't know what to expect, and the prospect of having to be elected was really

quite daunting. However, in the event, the canvassing was actually quite fun, talking to lots of people. Initially I got involved with setting up the Radlett Festival, after a lapse of some years, and went on to chair it for the next 10 years. I have been on the Planning Committee for my whole 16 years, and chaired it for the last 10 years

or so, which has been very interesting, often frustrating, but good to see so many residents attend the meetings and being able to represent their views to Hertsmere in a more official, structured way. I have sat on most of the committees during that period, but my last year as Chairman has been very rewarding (non-financially!) and extremely interesting. As most of you know, I am moving down to Dorset to be closer to my family, but after 41 years in Radlett, this will be a big change and I will certainly miss all of your friendship and camaraderie, and especially that of my council colleagues.

I wish all the new councillors as much enjoyment out of their time on APC as I have had!

I was co-opted on to APC 14 years ago and have served on every committee and several outside bodies over that time.

It seems to me that a Parish Council should

Members of APC are volunteers, and perhaps those dissatisfied residents should try to understand the responsibilities of Parish as opposed to Borough Councils. I have enjoyed being involved in all the activities of APC and hope my contribution has been helpful. It has been a very interesting 14 years!

Thanks to a kind sponsor, I was lucky enough to be awarded an MBE partly for services to the local community, and this was a highlight during my time on APC.

Spring has seen a busy time in the wood with our merry band of volunteers working hard each month on a variety of projects. We have continued to remove the overgrown holly, which allowed a profusion of bluebells to carpet the woodland floor. We have also removed more of the invasive snowberries, and planted blackthorn and hawthorn in the gaps of the hedge boundary. All of our efforts to clear the undergrowth produced a lot of deadwood, which we arranged to be chipped by the council groundmen. We then spread this over the main path, with a little help from our local Rainbows group, helping to stop it becoming too muddy. As summer approaches we have to be more careful, as we don't wish to disturb the nesting birds. Instead during out latest meet we were building birdboxes, ready to be put up next winter.

We also held a Spring Egg Hunt, with stamps hidden around the wood. Once participants found all the stamps they could exchange their completed sheet for a chocolaty prize!

We currently have juniors with world and European rankings. Many are competing nationally and internationally and Radlett is top of many of the Hertfordshire junior leagues. Our mini tennis (10&U) are travelling around the area defeating many of the well known clubs. We spent a few lunchtimes playing with the children at the school, making the most of the parachutes and sports equipment that we donated, some of which thy had never used before and were extremely excited about! It was so rewarding for us knowing that something so small that we were doing was making such a big impact in their lives by the joyous expressions on their faces. One day when we were out for dinner we caught the eve of a main Gambian TV Channel 'GTRS TV' who spoke to us and agreed to come and document some of what we were doing at the school. After they came and interviewed a few of us we found ourselves in the local newspapers the next day which must have been one of the most exciting moments for us. I most certainly felt famous! Alongside this we managed to squeeze in a few trips here and there to various animal parks (including monkeys and crocodiles), a day boat trip to Jufureh where the TV series 'Roots' based upon Kunta Kinteh was filmed and a couple of excursions out to the local beaches such as Leybato which were beautiful.

We donated bags of games equipment, sanitary products, stationery and clothing to the schools and local community and could immediately see what an impact these items would make on children's lives there. This fantastic trip enabled us to immerse ourselves into the local culture in so many ways including trying lots of new meals including Chicken Yassa and Benechin. We all came away feeling extremely grateful for what we have and have a greater understanding of how lucky we are, but also felt privileged that we were able to help less fortunate children and hopefully help to create a brighter future for many.

We would like to thank our hosts David and Janet Daniels and all of the people who supported us in our fundraising and in doing so helped us achieved an amazing life experience. We can't wait to tell our Brownie units all about it!

Note 1 - Precept -- this is the amount of your Council Tax that is allocated to Aldenham Parish Council.

Note 2 – Grants – This includes monies received from Hertsmere Borough Councillors. Ward Improvement Grant towards the Summer Events held in Phillimore Rec in the school holiday, plus the events held on Remembrance Day to mark the centenary since the end of World War 1. There were also funds towards the provision of recycling bins in Phillimore Rec. Plus funds from the Letchmore Heath Village Trust which saw a Christmas Tree provided near the village green at Christmas.

APC also donate to the Hertsmere Citizens Advice Service who provide a weekly 'drop in' morning on a Tuesday at the Radlett Centre, and in the afternoon the room is used by Community Hertsmere. Other grants are made to some local groups to enable them to continue their excellent work including the annual Remembrance Day Service. APC also subsidise the Newberries Car Park so the first hour of use is free.

Note 3 – Fees charged by the Council -- Income derived from the hire of the allotments, leases with various local organisations who use APC land, stalls at the Winter Fair, advertising in Around Radlett and for use of council land for filming etc. This year, a local resident purchased a bench in Theobald Street by the bus stop.

Note 4 – Section 106 funds & Community Infrastructure Levy – These are funds that are paid to Hertsmere Borough Council by developers and passed on to APC, as a condition of certain planning permissions granted. Section 106 funds must be spent on specific projects, which in 2018/19 was spent on a new noticeboard for Aldenham Green.

Section 106 planning obligations has been replaced by Community Infrastructure Levy which is less specific on where it is spent, although this must still be allocated to capital funding rather than day to day maintenance.

Note 5 – Council Administration – These are the costs of managing the council offices at the Radlett Centre including Planning, Accounts and general management.

Note 6 – Maintenance of Open Spaces -- These are the costs of maintaining the open spaces owned or leased by Aldenham Parish Council, including Phillimore Rec (the allotments, children's play area, main field and Fir Spring Wood), Scrubbitts Wood, Tykeside and Radlett Gardens, KGV Playing Fields, Aldenham Green, Letchmore Heath (The Green, the pond and Children's Play area) and Pegmire Lane. This includes staffing, equipment maintenance, planting (including the hanging baskets on the High Street) and repairs.

Note 7 – Grant and contribution to Radlett Centre costs – This includes grant funding towards ensuring that local societies can hire the building at much-reduced rates, as well as funding towards cleaning and maintenance and a fund for the larger items that should need replacing in the next fifteen years.

Note 8 – Community Events and interaction -- all costs associated with engaging with the community such as website, administration, Around Radlett, the Winter Fair, Summer Activities, Youth Council and other community events.

Note 9 – Radlett Neighbourhood Plan – These are the on-going costs so far for producing Radlett's first Neighbourhood Plan, which has just passed the final consultation, and is being submitted to the independent examiner for his/her consideration.

Note 10 - Capital Spending - Projects this year included secure fencing on land at Summerhouse Lane, planting hedging along the border of the allotments and main field at Phillimore Rec, funding the installation of CCTV at RadlettCC and Tabard RFC and finishing the upgrading of IT equipment in the office and depot.





The 12th Radlett Rotary Fun Run took place once again on Bank Holiday Monday, 6 May, at Tabard Rugby Club. As in previous years there were two races (1.5 km and 5 km), again generously sponsored by local chartered accountants Nagler Simmons.

The weather was fine and not too hot, and numbers this year were up on last year – 118 for the 1.5 km event and 221 for the 5 km. In addition to the runners there was a great crowd of spectators to cheer the runners on and refreshments were available from the Rugby Club. All participants and spectators had a most enjoyable and festive Bank Holiday morning. The Run is now well established as a popular annual Community event. Over £4000 was raised to be shared between Rotary charities and the associated charity, Hertsmere Mencap. The under 12 girls trophy was won by Issy Brockie and the under 16's by Lilly O'Dell and the corresponding boys trophies by Oscar Walsh and Reece Freeman. The team trophy was won by team BMCA, consisting of Ben Kelly, Mackenie Pullen, Conrad Holland and Andrew Rogers.

In the meantime, we will continue, with the help of a number of volunteers, to catalogue and digitise our extensive archives, which is a huge task!



Going on holiday

There are ways to give your home the 'lived in' look when it's unoccupied, so that any passing would-be thieves aren't tempted:

- Close and lock all windows, doors and outbuildings.
- Don't publish your absence on the Internet. Status updates, comments and photos can all give away the fact that your home is empty.
- Use timer switches for lamps so that they turn on as it gets dark in the evenings. You could also use a timer switch for a radio (always follow manufacturer's instructions).
- Ask your neighbour to put your rubbish or recycling bins back if they're being collected whilst you're away if they're left out after collection day it could indicate to a passing thief that your house is unoccupied. Be a good neighbour and do the same for them.
- If you aren't leaving your car at home, ask a neighbour/friend to park their car on your drive.
- Don't forget to cancel deliveries of milk, newspapers etc.
- Consider moving enticing items, such as laptops and mobile devices, so that they are out of sight.

Fir Spring Wood - Phillimore Recreation Ground



Fir Spring Wood is small-scale peri-urban woodland situated within Phillimore Recreation Ground, its boundaries being the main field of Phillimore Rec and the gardens of the properties along The Pathway. Like many small woodlands Fir Spring Wood sports, a number of steep banks. While adding to the topography of the woodland there is a constant danger of soil erosion and the exposure of tree roots. It has many pathways through it which have been formed through constant use, there is no recognised pathway.

In the past there was a pond that was formed, probably from a natural spring, hence the name, but this is not so present now. There is a wooden bench just inside the perimeter, and various fallen logs that have either broken off trees or when tree works were carried out previously they have been left to rot and sustain the local bug life.

Since 2015 Aldenham Parish Council has been undertaking a review of all land it owns or leases. This has led to the introduction of the 'Open Spaces Strategy' which aims to give an identity and purpose to each area enabling the Council to plan for its future, both in terms of finances, but also in consultation with parishioners and users to ensure sustainability of its land.

As part of its 'Open Spaces Strategy' Aldenham Parish Council (APC) asked Urban Forestry to draw up a woodland management plan for Fir Spring Wood. APC have already had a similar plan drawn up by another contractor on Scrubbitts Wood. Both of these plans are to ensure that the areas continue to add to the eco system in Radlett and provide usable green space in the area.

Urban Forestry's first impressions of Fir Spring Wood were good. Despite an intrinsically high level of soil compaction caused by intensive public footfall, the trees were in a generally good condition. They added that, in their opinion, Fir Spring Wood is an important and valuable public amenity and correspondingly well used by the local population.

The management plan noted the presence in the wood of English oak, Hornbeam, Wych Elm, Common Ash, Beech and mountain ash seedlings and saplings were in evidence, Gean (wild cherry) Silver Birch, Hazel Elder, Sallow and English Yew Holly, Sycamores, Norway Maple trees that were planted many years ago around the sports field. The plan commented that "Norway maple casts a dense shade

and will disrupt this woodland in the longer term" as well as Cherry Laurel which has invaded the other end of Fir Spring Wood.

Apart from the single English oak pollard on the woodland perimeter there are no trees in the woodland much more than 150 years old, although that does not mean woodland was not on this site prior to that.

This report noted that there were two areas that needed addressing

- The compaction of the soil due to the fact that visitors walked all over the wood. Whilst this was a pus point for visitors, this could lead to saplings that were being grown were trampled on before they were established. This could lead to there being insufficient trees to replace those approaching the end of their life cycle.
- The invasive species such as Norway Maple and Cherry Laurel were establishing themselves in certain parts of the wood. This could lead to the loss of local species such as Hornbeam and Oak.

The report divided the wood into six compartments as shown below. The action plan drawn up by the contractor was taken over ten years in order to ensure that there was a gradual rather any dramatic change which may affect the woods, both from a user's perspective and access.

This management plan was adopted by the APC in September 2018.

The first year works are to remove all invasive species in compartments 1, 2 & 3. This is the removal of the Norway Maple and Cherry Laurel. The debris from the removed trees will be used to block off some the entrances, particularly from the old grass tennis courts on Phillimore Rec. The council asks that you respect this action as the land that will not be trampled on will be planted in due course with trees that will then have the protection and hopefully grow.

This will probably happen in the Autumn is quite an undertaking that will be carried out by approved contractors who are known to APC.
