Food banks were set up for families struggling to earn a living and online shopping, home visits, local society programmes, religious services and even choirs could all be accessed via our computers, tablets and phones. The Parish Council meetings have been held via Zoom and Officers have been working from home. This has become the new normal.

During this time, APC produced a monthly Newsletter which was sent out via email to as many individuals as possible. We would like to thank the Open Spaces team who have been keeping the play equipment clean and safe, as well as maintaining the outdoor gym and ensuring the area looks well-kept and inviting. They even managed to put up the hanging baskets in the village as usual! Many people have remarked that during lockdown they were able to discover walks and footpaths that they didn’t even know existed.

The APC website is going through a review process at the moment and a new site will be up and running very soon. This will enable the public to find the information they require more easily. Please do take a look at the website as it is a good way of knowing what

At the time of writing, The Radlett Centre is still closed. 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Tree Cedric - The tree on the front cover is "Cedric"

'Cedric' was the name given to a fine Cedar of Lebanon tree which stood in the front garden of a house in Newberries Avenue. I suspect that this fine tree was similarly appreciated by the Victorian/Edwardian predecessors who lived and worked on the Newberries Estate up to the 1930s.

Until recently, Cedric (so named by the owners of the house where the tree stands) graced the Avenue particularly in the vicinity of houses 66-80, where its massive canopy towered over the road and nearby houses.

Over the years, the tree stood strong against the worst gales that pass our way, with hardly a wave of a branch. Up to September 2004, Cedric had a companion Cedar tree of a similar age, two doors away, but unfortunately it succumbed to lightning in a storm and had to be felled for reasons of safety.

But this year, Cedric, aged over 150 years, suffered badly from the cold, dry spring followed by the very hot weather. Sadly, Cedric was deemed 'unsafe', and the Tree Officer at Hertsmere Borough Council, Mark Pigden, agreed to lift the TPO that for many years had protected Cedric from potential developers.

Twig-by-twig, branch by branch, Cedric was reduced to chips, except the massive 40m trunk which had to be sliced up into smaller sections so it could be removed by truck.

A slice of the lower trunk was requested for the Radlett Museum, in order to show the tree rings which indicated the Cedar's annual growth. A large 20cm thick cutting was left in the front garden ready for collection. But shortly after, and quite mysteriously, the slice of the trunk disappeared. It would have been an exceptional exhibit....Could the ghost of Cedric have returned to collect it?

We are going to install a café, which will be accessible from both the children's play area and the main area of the park. The


gates are all going to be changed making them much easier for people with buggies to get in and out but still child friendly.

High Street Furniture re-paint 2020



In March 2019, Aldenham Parish Council (APC) agreed that as it had been twenty years since Herts County Council (HertsCC) had painted the street furniture in Radlett High Street, they were due a facelift. Each of Hertsmere's high streets have their own distinctive

colour for street furniture. In Radlett, this was burgundy red. This colour was used on all the lampposts, benches and other street furniture along Watling Street by the shops.

HertsCC, which owns the street furniture, agreed to repaint the furniture but would not agree to finance it completely. So APC negotiated with Councillor Caroline Clapper who gave some of the money from her Highway Locality budget and

the rest was collected from the Community Infrastructure Levy. The total cost was just under £25,000.

The next step was to find a colour that was acceptable to the majority of the residents of the parish. Three columns outside the Radlett Centre were painted burgundy (the original colour), dark green and black. A survey over the winter of 2019, showed that the vast majority favoured burgundy.

HertsCC were commissioned to carry out the work, which was undertaken over the summer.

I am sure you will agree from the photos, that this a vast improvement.



The Radlett Centre

As many of you may have noticed, the Radlett Centre, like all theatres in the country, has been closed since March. We had hoped to have reopened by the autumn, but government restrictions have not changed sufficiently to permit us to do that.

The staff have had a complicated job on their hands sorting



refunds for all the shows scheduled for this year, and have dealt with the refunds as soon as the situation allowed.

We would particularly like to thank all of you who have allowed us to keep your funds on account to use against any future production. I can reassure you that monies held are entirely safe, and we do look forward to being able to announce a season as soon as we are able.

As soon as we have a clearer picture, we will communicate through our website, Facebook and other channels to spread the word. In the meantime, keep safe and well, and we look forward to re-opening soon with some great shows.





Walks around Radlett

During the recent lock down months, the footpath walks booklet has been well used. The booklet contains details and directions of nine circular local walks and some pass by features of significant historical or architectural interest. The walks have been selected to enable walkers of all ages and walking abilities to explore the area around Radlett. The walks vary in length from 3.5 to 7 km (2.25

to 4.5 miles), and it is possible to link the walks together if you want to go further.

The booklet is available to purchase from the Aldenham Parish Council office, when it reopens. The booklet is an all-weather publication as the paper used has been specially shower proofed. You can also download the booklet by going to the APC's website and clicking on Publications.

Volunteer Health Walk Leaders Training Morning for Covid-19.

In order to restart the Health Walks in Aldenham/Radlett, during Covid-19, volunteer health walk leaders were sent pages of documents explaining terms such as, Social Distancing, Face Coverings, Touching Items, Hand Hygiene and First Aid. The latter explained that CPR was to be used with compressions only, no rescue breaths! We were also sent a further 4 pages of Risk Assessments.

When we had read through these documents, the trainers arranged that we should meet to discuss these regulations and then go on a trial walk.

Twelve walk leaders assembled in Oakmere Park, Potters Bar, where we were instructed to stand 2 metres apart in a circle by the instructor. She even had a tape measure to show us how far apart we should be from each other.

We were given 30 minutes of instructions before setting off. In order to start the walk, we had to cross the busy High Street to get to Parkfields. We had to use the pedestrian crossing controlled by lights. When the green light finally came on, only 5 people managed to cross before it went red again. After nearly 5 minutes, we finally all managed to cross the road.

All went well until we came to a narrow footpath. The walk leader had to walk down it until he came to a wide enough section, just in case another pedestrian may be coming our way. He was then instructed to blow his whistle twice if it was clear to walk down. Those walkers at the back could not hear the whistle. Fortunately, we could just see the leader, waving for us to come on, in the distance.

I cannot imagine what it would be like when we actually start the walks with a maximum of 25 walkers as some people walk slowly.

Did we complete the walk you might ask? Yes, we did when we finally worked out how to cross the main road again. This time the traffic waited longer than necessary to let us all cross the road even though our light had turned red!

the restrictions eased and following advice from Bowls England we opened applying the distancing rules. Only three of our six rinks were used at any one time and via a booking system only.

Then, come July, there was a further easing for outdoor sports clubs and the green became fully available. We were able to have all six rinks in use subject to a maximum of 30 players on the green at any time. We suddenly were able to start our in-house competitions and to have regular bowling afternoons throughout the week, always keeping within the rules and regulations. The fine summer certainly was a tremendous bonus.


This spread by word of mouth and online via Radlett U3A. We were inundated with requests to learn to bowl and our fully trained coaches were kept busy. For insurance

The Radlett & District Museum now open

By the time you read this, the Museum should have opened to visitors for the first time on Saturday 17 October. After that, it will be open from 10 to 12 noon on Wednesdays and Saturdays.

The Museum will offer permanent displays of local photos, documents, maps, artefacts, etc plus themed exhibitions and recordings and transcripts of interviews with local residents. The displays will be changed regularly.

Full COVID prevention and safety procedures will be followed. This means that a maximum of four visitors, plus two stewards, will be allowed inside at any one time. All visitors must wear face coverings, hand sanitisers will be available and social distancing requirements must be observed. Should you arrive and there are already four visitors in the building, you will be asked to wait outside or come back later.


Stuart Thorne (1944 - 2020)

Stuart Anthony Thorne, who passed away in September aged 75, was a master tailor and a Radlett man through and through.

He was also a serious gardener, bee keeper, birdwatcher, music lover, photographer and collector of vintage Madeira wine as well as an active member of the Chamber of Commerce in the 70's and 80's and the Radlett Rotary Club.

He was also a devoted partner to Maureen and they would have celebrated their Golden Wedding Anniversary next year.

Stuart was very proud to be asked to have his portrait painted by John Walton (Royal Academy of Portrait Artists), another legendary Radlett man. John had been asked to submit a painting to be hung in the People's Portrait Collection at Girton College Cambridge which depicts people from a wide range of professions, trades and skills. The portrait, which you can see below, will be there in perpetuity.



Stuart was born in Edgware and left school at 15 with the sole intention of becoming a tailor.

Tailoring very much ran in the family on his mother's side going back 300 years to Malmo in Sweden. His uncle was in military tailoring and his mother a waistcoat maker.

In 1960 he began his apprenticeship with Cooling, Lawrence and Wells and after qualifying and a further three years with coatmakers Hawes and Curtis, he set up shop on his own in Radlett with his parents' help to buy the property in Aldenham Road.

By advertising in the Herts Advertiser Stuart got ten initial customers, some of whom remained with him for life. Stuart continued working well into 2019 and could still sit up on his workbench, creating a masterpiece almost without looking, whilst conducting a conversation about something completely different. His clients included many surgeons and the newsreader Richard Baker.

He and Maureen met on a blind date and soon discovered they had much in common, including collecting bonsai trees which merged when they were married in Christ Church, Radlett in 1971.

The same year Stuart and Maureen took their first allotment, a hobby that they

both loved and they also joined the Radlett Horticultural Society. Stuart was a perfectionist in everything he did and the allotment was no exception.

Stuart also became very involved with Radlett life and became vice chairman of the Chamber of Commerce as well as a member of Probus. He was also a founder member of the Rotary Club and used his skills to help make the rotary wheel which is still used today.

Fundraising was also a bit of a theme. He agreed to do a 10km run with Stuart Nagler and although he succeeded he said, 'never again'. Much more to his liking was a sponsored knit where he was so good that he cost some of his sponsors a fortune.

Stuart will be very much missed in Radlett and it would be no exaggeration to say that he was an institution in himself. He was also the longest serving sole trader in the village. They really don't make them like him anymore - rest in peace.





Cynthia Barker (1962 - 2020)

Cynthia Barker was appointed Mayor of Hertsmere in June 2020, having served as Deputy Mayor last year. She had been a Borehamwood borough councillor since last year, and a borough councillor for Potters Bar from 2015 until 2019.

Cynthia was the first Philippine-born elected representative in the borough, and was extremely proud of her heritage. She was committed to doing her utmost to champion equality and diversity for all communities in Hertsmere. She was chosen as one of the 100 most influential Filipinas by the Filipina Women’s Network.

Cynthia was a tireless community advocate, volunteering for a wide range of local organisations and charities. Hertsmere Managing Director, Sajida Bijle, wrote: ‘I know how honoured she [Cllr Barker] was to be appointed to Deputy Mayor last year and then

as Mayor, and how much she enjoyed undertaking a whole host of duties across our communities. She will be greatly missed by us all.’

Paul Howard (1974 - 2020)


We are very sad to announce the death of former Radlett resident, Paul Howard on 20 September 2020.

People come together in a time of crisis and we have seen many examples of positive contributions to society, helping and protecting those most vulnerable. Our online neighbourhood watch (OWL) has been keeping the community safe featuring regular updates about crime (especially scams) and COVID-19 information.

The Government's pledge for additional police officers is finally seeing numbers increase on the front line. PC Morris has joined PCSO Boca and myself to strengthen our team, looking after Aldenham East and West wards. PC Morris is an experienced officer having worked in Hertsmere for several years and has knowledge of safer neighbourhood policing having previously been a PCSO.

Our most reported crime (apart from domestic incidents) are thefts from motor vehicles. We know criminals are wandering the streets at night checking for insecure vehicles and are successful in stealing items of value mainly branded sunglasses, cash and wallets (leading to contactless bank card transactions). Please double check your vehicle is locked and secure and remove any valuables from within. Commercial vehicles have also been targeted during the day for tools so please advise anyone working on your home to keep them secure and lock the van when away from it. We have made a number of arrests since March using CCTV and forensics - some local offenders and others from out of town.

As the nights draw in, late afternoon/early evening break-ins will be on the rise. Unlit homes are often targeted with simple cheap and effective devices such as timer switches for lamps/fake TVs providing excellent security.
