Chairman's Message

This issue finds us in the midst of a busy spring and summer, with the first events of the year having already taken place – a full day celebration of King Charles III's

Coronation where we live- streamed the proceedings at the Phillimore Recreation Ground before showing the film, 'Paddington', for the hardy crowd who stayed despite the worsening weather.

That same week also saw the local elections being held, with all twelve seats being contested. Several of our previous councillors did not re-stand and I would like to put on record my thanks to all councillors who have held office over the past four years; their efforts in organising events such as our Coronation celebrations, the Solar Farm appeal and this very magazine cannot be adequately expressed, but it is thanks to volunteers like them that we have such an amazing community here in Radlett. In particular, I would like to mention one by name, Jackie Lefton, who served on the Parish Council for many years and also acted as Co-Chairman of the Council. Our special thanks go to her.

I would also like to welcome our new Councillors – Sandra Benjamin, Sahil Ali, Romy Rosehill, Anthony Butwick, Carl Woolf and Daniel Nygate. Each has written a few words of introduction in this edition of 'Around Radlett'.

Another welcome I would like to make is to Patchetts Green, which has re-joined the Parish after a boundary review conducted by Hertsmere. I was very fortunate to meet several residents in March, and it was great to discuss how we can work together to improve it's community spaces, such as the green.

Other events organised since our last issue include our annual Winter Fair and Christmas lights switchon, which was also popular. We had a great turnout, especially given the cold and rain on the day. There was a wonderful selection of stalls, rides and Santa's grotto, while the lights were switched on by the delightful Dame Dotty. In April, we also had our Annual Parish Meeting, which is always a good opportunity for local residents to learn more about the Parish Council and what it has done in the preceding year, and it's plans for the future.

In May, I was delighted to be invited, along with John Graham, the Mayor of Hertsmere, to present the medals and awards at the Rotary Club's Annual Fun Run on May Day Bank Holiday. It was wonderful to see such a long-standing community event start to rebuild numbers after COVID, and there was a terrific turn out, both of adults and children, for the two courses. They all did incredibly well, and I was very impressed with their enthusiasm and commitment. Many congratulations to all!

The Planning Inspector held the inquiry into the proposed Solar Farm over 9 days in October and November last year, where APC's legal team and experts helped put up a strong defence as to why this plan is entirely unsuitable for the location. This has now been 'called in' by the Secretary of State to make the decision personally as it is recognised to be of such importance. At the time of writing in May, we were still awaiting this decision.

I would once again like to thank all APC staff for their hard work this past year, without whom the smooth running of the Council and events could not happen. Our Open Spaces team have continued to look after our community areas, ensuring that the Phillimore Recreation Ground once again received the Green Flag Award.

Lastly, my thanks to the council for re-electing me as Chair. It has been an honour and a pleasure to serve over the last year and I look forward to the year ahead and all APC has planned!

King's Coronation

After the success of the Jubilee events last year, Aldenham Parish Council (APC) received many requests for another such

community event. When Saturday 6 May was announced as the date of the Coronation of Charles III, it was agreed that this would provide a perfect opportunity to bring everyone together again to celebrate the historic day.



day of the The Coronation dawned grey but clear, and several hundred people gathered at Phillimore Recreation Ground where a giant screen had been set up to livestream the proceedings from

Westminster Abbey. Although the weather worsened throughout the day, this was well in line with tradition for Coronations, given that it also rained heavily at the late Queen's Coronation in 1953! Just as back then, the rain did not dampen the celebratory spirit, with plenty of flags, bunting, and even Union Jack hats contributing to the sense of occasion.



Although the weather caused a few technical difficulties getting the stream up and running, the technicians succeeded in the nick of time, and brought the splendour of the Abbey to those waiting in the park. It was wonderful to be able to witness such an important ceremony surrounded by friends, family and the wider community. All those attending had had the opportunity to reserve picnic tables and chairs, which provided an ideal base from which to watch the Coronation and to enjoy the many other attractions set up in the park.

We were very fortunate to have a funfair with a carousel, teacups, swings, dodgems and various inflatables, along with a miniature railway and face painting, with unlimited turns all included in the wristbands on sale. Our youngest guests were the hardiest, as they were determined to have as many rides as possible, no matter how heavy the rain beat down! There was also a fantastic selection of food trucks providing some very welcome hot Radlett meals. Prep and the Scouts manned community stalls, while APC hosted a children's craft tent, along with information boards about the work we



do and the projects in which the council is involved.

After the Coronation was concluded, and just before His Majesty had appeared on the balcony, the Deputy



Lord Lieutenant of Hertfordshire, Rev Patrick Moriarty, gave a speech in which he spoke eloquently about the importance of community. APC gives thanks to the Deputy Lieutenant for attending, and for staying so long and talking to so many.

Leaders listed their thoughts: Helping shape and share a safe space with the girls; celebrating community and differences; creating new opportunities for the girls, while allowing them to explore a range of activities, skills, and making friends; engaging with the natural world and building confidence to meet and face new challenges in an environment where they can simply be themselves; passing on skills to girls and young women over the years, many of whom return to volunteer as Young Leaders and Leaders; enabling adults to accompany groups nationally and internationally, eg to Scotland, Switzerland and Uganda; inviting volunteers to share the fun and friendship and to empower our young women to achieve their potential; team-building activities such as 'Reflect Skills Builder activity' and 'Young Leader Day scavenger hunt'; the thrill of watching the girls' progress; teaching arts and crafts, cookery, the natural world, and other practical skills such as sailing, camping, climbing, hill and gorge walking; providing financial support to learn and take gualifications in these activities.

Nagler Simmons Radlett Rotary Five Fields Fun Run - Monday 1 May



A bit of drizzle and a cloudy sky didn't stop this year's fun being a success. With a total of 155 runners in the 2 events, about £2,000 was raised, and thanks to the sponsorship of Nagler Simmons, every penny of this will

be shared between "Hertsmere Mencap" and other Rotary supported charities.

This year we also had inflatables for the children, provided and managed for us by Keen Bean Sport. These proved to be a great attraction.

There were two races - a shorter run of 1.5km for those under the age of 11, followed by a longer run of 5km for those from 7 to 107 years of age.

Medals and trophies for the 2 events were presented by Hertsmere Mayor John Graham, Aldenham Parish Council

Chair Helen Jones, and Radlett Rotary President Kathy Rose.

The 1.5 km event was won by Isaac Kissman in 6 min 25 secs and the first girl through was Charlotte Duggleby, some 30 seconds later. The winner of the 5 km event was Zac Segal in exactly 18 minutes, and the first lady through was Kat Alpe, about $1\frac{1}{2}$ minutes later.

There were medals for all finishers, as well as trophies for the winners. For the 5 km event, as well as trophies for the first 3 male/female runners past the post, there were trophies for the first boy/girl under 12 and under 16, the first male/ female veteran 45 and over, the first vet 60 and over, and for the winning team of 4 - see Nagler Simmons web site at www.naglersimmons.co.uk for a full list of the results. Community Infrastructure Levy Grants

The Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) is a charge that local authorities can set on new developments in order to raise funds to upgrade the infrastructure, facilities and services.

As part of this levy, Aldenham Parish Council (APC) automatically receives 15% of any CIL levied on developments within the parish. Due to the adopted Radlett Neighbourhood Plan in May 2021, APC also

receives a further 10% of CIL collected from developments within the Radlett Neighbourhood Plan area only, which can then be spent on the capital projects within the whole parish.

The APC's CIL capital grants scheme for local voluntary organisations and community groups introduced in 2020 is to help fund capital projects within the parish.

APC has set aside funding from the CIL to invest in the local community with grants of between £1,000 to £20,000 available to applicants for capital spending. Core organisational costs such as salaries, rent or utilities are not eligible.

So far, grants totalling £34,592.26 have been awarded to 4 local organisations:

- Radlett Bowls Club -- £1,562.85 towards repairs to the surrounds at the ground and £2,500 towards a new pump for the sprinkler system
- 1st Radlett Scouts -- £10,000 for new front entrance to Scout Hut
- Aldenham War Memorial Hall -- £8,750 towards the creation of a centenary garden at the Hall
- Radlett Men Club -£ 2, 679.41 for a beer cooler & £2,500 towards their garden area
- Radlett Districts Guides £6,600 for extension to external paved area and refurbishment of pathway

Access for All Working Party update

Aldenham Parish Council's Access for All Working Party worked hard throughout 2022, supporting inclusion, access and equity in our community. This special working group, formed to coincide with the release of the Government's National Disability Strategy in 2021, aims to address the many aspects of our local environment, from high street walkways to parks and open spaces and community events, and about the mare approach for people of all ages with any lovel of disability wishle and atherwise.

which could and should be more accessible for people of all ages with any level of disability – visible and otherwise.

As well as taking practical action, APC's Access for All Working Party also highlights milestones throughout the year to raise awareness and promote understanding. Whether this be about dementia, Alzheimer's Disease, Autism, Down's Syndrome, mental health or women-centric topics, we are taking to our social media channels, our website, sign posting local services and working with local charities and groups to extend their sphere of influence.

Disability Awareness Month, last December, was a prime opportunity to share the little acts of kindness which positively impact people's lives. Stories shared by people in the community included when a local lady took the time and helped a fellow shopper with his wheelchair, and when, during a challenging moment of being overwhelmed and in a 'meltdown', a kind stranger came to the rescue of a young autistic child with chocolate eggs and a friendly, non-judgemental extra pair of hands to get safely back into a waiting vehicle.

It's these acts of kindness which help elevate our community to one people WANT to live in, not just HAPPEN to live in. Our differences, whatever they are, bring us closer together.

Phillimore Recreation Ground Improvement Working Party Phase 1 – Café

Aldenham Parish Council (APC) has been granted planning permission by Hertsmere Borough Council, to build a café/tea room at Phillimore Recreation Ground in Gills Hill.

The building will be situated by the entrance to the main field, next to the depot and opposite the children's play areas, and will have both inside and outside seating. The building will be ecologically friendly, with the use of sustainable construction materials, and solar panels to help reduce energy costs. The area surrounding the building will have planters and possibly some new trees.

APC is tendering for a project manager to manage budgets, organise the design team, and draw up a further tender for the contractor who will build it. Once the project manager has been appointed, APC will concurrently tender for an experienced food service operator to run it. The operator will be given the opportunity to be involved with the design team to plan for the most efficient interior and exterior seating, service and storage areas, and kitchen design.

APC also has plans to enhance other areas of Phillimore Recreation Ground, including new gates, a bike park, improved notice boards, and a path going all around the playing field making it easier for pushchairs and wheelchairs, etc. It also plans to improve the children's play area, as it expects the area to become much busier once the new café/tea room opens.

New rail freight interchange

Aldenham Parish Council has expressed its concerns regarding Hertfordshire Council Council's (HCC) proposals to sell the land upon which Helioslough wish to develop a strategic rail terminal. The following letter was sent to the Deputy Chief Executive at HCC;

Dear Mr Crudgington,

15 February 2023

Strategic Rail Freight Interchange

I am writing on behalf of Aldenham Parish Council (APC) regarding the above. Members of the council were very concerned to hear of Herts County Council's proposals to sell the land upon which Helioslough wish to develop a strategic rail terminal.

APC strongly urge the panel, when it reviews this decision this month, not to sell the parcel of land known as the Old Radlett Aerodrome to SEGRO, for development into a Strategic Rail Freight Interchange.

APC recognise that the Aerodrome site, known colloquially as The Old Radlett Aerodrome, is in fact wholly within the Parish of St. Stephen. However, the effects of this development will be felt, within the parish, especially Radlett due to traffic movements from lorries servicing the terminal, and those working at the facility who may well be residents of Borehamwood who will access via the already congested roads of Radlett.

Also, the neighbouring parish of St Stephens will be affected especially those in Park Street. Due to a lack of infrastructure within the vicinity (there is only the A414) there will a knock-on effect to residents of St. Albans, Hatfield, Hemel Hempstead, Welwyn Garden City, Sandridge, Wheathampstead, & Redbourn will also be affected by the disruption caused by the increase in vehicular traffic, especially when problems occur on the M25 and M1, which they do frequently. The estimate of the developers was that there would be a further 3,000 lorries every 24 operating in and out of the site, onto already overcrowded roads.

The threat of this development has been hanging over the heads of the parish since 2006. Even then there were questions regarding the need for such a development. Surely, as so much time has lapsed since the decision was made by the Secretary of State there should be a strategic (excuse the pun) review. We now have other sites such as the London Gateway, the Interchange at Rugby and Derby. Unlike the point when the permission was granted the position regarding the perceived benefits, after the opening of alternative facilities, and the effects of Brexit, are much diminished, so there is even less justification for sale.

The developers have not, as yet, complied with their commitment to set up a consultative group with local councillors, residents and community groups. They have not made any provision for improvements to the Park Street, Harper Lane and London Colney roundabouts. As stated at the time of the decision APC would prefer to see progress on a junction onto and off the M25.

Although this development was originally planned as a Rail Freight Interchange it is and has always been going to be a Lorry for Lorry interchange – evidenced by the huge increase in lorry movements predicted by the developers themselves. An enormous amount of work to reconstruct and alter the rail links has to be carried out before any of the freight trains can use the lines, work which they do not, as far as we are aware, have permission for.

APC are aware that Herts County Council has a fiduciary duty, due to its current budget deficit, to get the best price for the land, but APC's view is that this does not consider the long term effects on the residents of St Stephens and Aldenham Parish, their welfare. HertsCC surely has a duty of care, a duty of prudence and more and so APC urge the panel to take the whole into consideration.

2022-23 Tree/Whip/Bulb planting season

Aldenham Parish Council's Parks & Open Spaces adopted a Biodiversity Action Plan in November 2021. In order to improve and enhance the biodiversity in our local Parks & Open Spaces, this planting season the Open Spaces Team has planted trees, hedges, whips and bulbs at the following locations.



Phillimore Recreation Ground

We planted 3 prunus trees in the newly sown wildflower area, 6 scots pine, 500 bluebell bulbs in Fir Spring Wood and 1 oak tree. We have also planted 56 laurel hedge whips in the children's play area.

Tykeside

We planted 3 prunus trees and 200 mixed daffodil bulbs.



Salters Field

A tree ceremony was held on 7 February 2023 at Salters Field to commemorate the planting of 7 trees kindly donated by the Rotary Club. Rotary donated 2 carpinus betulus, 2 quercus robur, 1 malus floribunda, and 2 tilia platyphyllos.

Aldenham Parish Council has also purchased and planted 7 more substantial trees, namely 2 carpinus

betulus, 1 acer campestre, 1 prunus aviurm plena, 1 betula pendula, 1 sorbus ulleungensis 'olympic flame' and 1 malus evereste.

We very much hope this will help to establish and increase



the variety of tree species in this lovely open space area.

Picnic Field

75 hedge whips of mixed planting of ligustrum, pryus communis, malus sylvestris, rhamnus frangula, prunus cerasifera and betula pubescens were planted, as well as 25 whips of hawthorn in the Queen's Platinum Jubilee Area.

We will continue to plant further trees in our next planting season, as there are so many benefits in planting trees.

• Trees help to fight the climate crisis: trees are a bit of a miracle, in more ways than one! But one of their best qualities is their ability to act like sponges for carbon. They absorb carbon by removing it from the air and locking it in their wood and roots.

• Trees purify the air: trees don't just munch carbonthey also produce oxygen. One tree can produce enough oxygen for four people.

• Trees help sustain wildlife: they create habitats for all kinds of wildlife from squirrels, and bats to bees, owls and woodpeckers.

• Trees are good for our health and prosperity: it has been proved that trees do everything from helping lower stress levels to raising property values. It's part of our nature to like trees-and science has proved that just looking at them can make us feel calmer, happier and more creative.

APC will continue to plant more trees in future planting seasons for the well-being of all of the community.

Here is a challenge, have you ever eaten something you have grown yourself?

I know a lot of people, myself included, have been growing their own vegetables for years and we have probably forgotten the pleasure you get when you first

put your own produce on the plate. It is easier than it sounds so here are a few simple ideas, even if you don't have a garden.

Climbing French beans – buy a few plants and plant them in a pot in good potting compost in a sunny corner, water regularly and even the stringiest plants produce a good tasty crop. If you have nothing to grow them up just grow the bush variety, which will be just as prolific.

Tomatoes – all you need is a sunny corner, a growbag, three plants, three canes and some tomato feed. Oh, and some string to tie them to the canes. Regular watering and removal of the side shoots will produce a delicious crop.

The Radlett Art Society,

Tip - choose a small fruiting variety for best results.

Cucumbers – sound complicated but aren't. These are even more prolific than tomatoes and can also be grown in a growbag. They do need support, and again, remove the side shoots and tie them up. 'Marketmore' are a good starter variety producing bite sized fruit. If you don't have a garden you can use a windowsill. Cress starter kits are great fun and grow extremely fast for a delicious egg and cress sandwich. Also the internet is awash with herb starter kits that can be grown on the windowsill. And for those without a garden, mini vegetable plots are available for minimal rent at Radlett allotments.

Lastly, with our increasingly unpredictable climate, mulching is more important than ever. Horse manure is an excellent mulch and can be obtained free from the stables at the Elstree end of Allum Lane. Follow the 'free manure' signs and remember to close the gate and take a few bags and a spade. The giant pile of manure is through the stable area and 500 yards up the track.

Shenley Hill development refused permission after resistance from local residents, parish and local councillors By Clir Lucy Selby

Since August 2022 local residents, together with local borough and parish councillors have been fighting the planning application 2022/1539/OUT in relation to the land south of Shenley Hill, where it was proposed to build 195 houses on Green Belt land. The councillors unanimously stated that as the proposed site is in the Green Belt, no development should be allowed.

Objecting to this application, Radlett residents formed WhatsApp and Facebook groups to share their thoughts, leading to an unprecedented 2799 formal objections being lodged through the Hertsmere planning portal! These, together with formal objections from local borough and parish councillors, led Hertsmere's planning committee members to refuse to grant their permission at the end of February 2023.

The refusal was on the grounds that the applicant had not demonstrated that there were any special circumstances for allowing this development on the Green Belt. They also noted that the development would erode the buffer between Radlett, Shenley, and Borehamwood. It is a core principle of the Green Belt planning policy to 'prevent urban sprawl by keeping land permanently open'.

It was also refused on the grounds of it being a risk to potential archaeological artefacts at the site. Although this has not been investigated, the County Council's archaeological team felt that as the site is so near to the ancient Roman road, Watling Street, this might present a risk to any buried antiquities. Another reason for the refusal was that insufficient information had been provided to mitigate the risk of flooding from surface water at the site.

The proposed number of homes would have seen an increase in Radlett's population by approximately 7%, and it is well documented that the village cannot support any extra demands from its already strained infrastructure.

Herts Highways correctly objected to this application. They recognised that the only proposed access point was onto Shenley Hill, which is a single carriageway, steep and winding country lane. Turning into the access road of the site would be next to a 90 degree bend; and adding 195 homes with one to two cars per household would put even more pressure on the country lane.

Oliver Dowden MP, Deputy Prime Minister, visited the proposed application site in January 2023, and said, 'this is green belt land and should not be developed on except in exceptional circumstances. I don't believe there are exceptional circumstances here and I fully support residents in making their voices heard'.

Hertsmere officers listened, and the planning committees listened. Your local borough and parish councillors will continue to fight any appeals on this site. Thank you for all your efforts and support as we fight to protect our Green Belt.

Addendum – The developer has now lodged an appeal against Hertsmere's decision, which is due to be held in August 2023. Aldenham Parish Council has registered as a Rule 6 party to the appeal, in order to carry on fighting on behalf of it's residents.

Keeping people safe is at the heart of what we do. We have been asking the general public how safe they feel in their community via Echo* and StreetSafe surveys.

The key issues raised were:

- Streetlighting: People felt unsafe walking in the dark, especially commuters. We have spoken with local councillors to highlight this ٠ concern to explore what can be done to improve street lighting and other poorly lit areas.
- CCTV: The lack of CCTV in Radlett was also raised. As part of our next priority, we have submitted applications to Hertsmere Borough Council to request mobile cameras at crime and ASB hotspots.
- Burglary: The recent increase in burglaries has been of concern to residents. Our last priority focussed on three of the most historically targeted roads (Beech Avenue, Gills Hill Lane and Shenley Hill). These were visited by the Safer Neighbourhood Team and we provided crime prevention advice and signed all houses up to OWL**. We're pleased to report that we haven't received reports of break-ins in these locations.

Other schemes to promote personal safety:

- Hollie Guard is a personal safety app which offers several features designed to protect you when travelling to and from home, exercising, socialising etc. If you feel unsafe, you can shake your phone, sending an alert to your chosen contacts. You can also use 'deterrent mode', which emits a high-pitched alarm and flashing light or 'stealth mode' to trigger a discreet alarm. Most features include audio and video recording, as well tracking your GPS location.
- The Ask for Angela scheme encourages people on a first date (or who have met someone for the first time) and who feel unsafe to 2) get help from bar staff by simply asking to speak to "Angela." Staff would then assist the person in leaving the venue discreetly and getting home or to a place of safety.
- Ask Clive is organised by LGBT+ charity Ask For Clive. Pub Pride aims to work with venues and organisations to promote LGBT+ 3) inclusion and provide welcome spaces for the community. The initiative also aims to ensure a zero-tolerance approach towards LGBT+ discrimination.
